Squaw Hash is delicious, whether made with fresh or canned corn on a camp trip. It is a particularly fine way of preparing green corn which is a little too tough to be eaten from the cob as so frequently happens toward the end of the corn season. Fry eight slices of bacon, cut fine. Pour off the fat if there is too much. Then add eight ears of fresh corn cut from the cob, or two cans of corn, together with one green pepper, washed, seeded, and chopped fine. Add salt, if necessary, and continue cooking until it browns. Serve on toast or crackers. This will serve eight.

Wild Game Shows Heavy Increase

WASHINGTON (AP)—Wild game in the United States is increasing and by 1960 there will be the abundance of game that was available to the sportsmen of 1880, in the opinion of H. P. Sheldon, chief game warden of the United States.

"The American sportsman is winning his fight to conserve and perpetuate wild game," Sheldon said. "We are well forward in a new advance, which will be marked by a constant increase in the numbers of our valuable species of fish, birds and animals."

"Never before have the sportsmen and conservationists been so

strongly and effectively organized and never before have the official agencies of conservation found such large sums of money at their disposal for advancing their work."

Sheldon said that game and fish regulations are being religiously observed in every section of the country. Destruction of game that went on a century past has now been solidly checked.

"There still remains, however, pressing need for anti-pollution laws, the training and employment of an adequate force of game protectors, provisions for expanding areas for the care and feeding of our increasing game stock, the reduction of vermin, study and control of disease and the troublesome problem of harmon-

Light Eating At Night is Urged

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.—If you want to be "hopping around like children" when you are 63, eat lightly before retiring, according to the advice of modern science.

"Early to bed and early to rise makes a man healthy, wealthy and wise" all depends on how and when a person eats, says Dr. Sheldon P. Strange, San Francisco.

"Ninety percent of us eat a heavy meal before retiring," said

Dr. Strange. "That's why the life rate approximates 60 years instead of 100. Science has discovered that a light meal at night, with the heavy meal at noon, results in increased vitality and resistance to disease."

"If we made a habit of eating in this manner we would be hopping about like children when we are 60."

Dr. Strange said fermentation and putrefaction are the greatest enemies of man. These ailments result when rich food is taken into the system at night, and over a period of years they weaken the muscular tissues and membranes, inducing premature old age.
