## GOLDEN BEARS ARE SOMEWHAT WEAKENED

BERKELEY, Aug. 5.—(UP)—Will California's Golden Bears cover themselves with the glory that has been theirs during the past five years, last season excepted, of going through a season undefeated? Sports writers in the Bay district are already beginning to ask themselves that question and the answer seems to be "they will not."

Lack of reserve backfield strength seems to threaten big gaping wounds in the hearts of even the most optimistic and already the friends of "Nibb" Price, who has stepped into the shoes of the late Andy Smith as head coach at the University of California, are exempting him from blame if disaster develops because of this weak spot.

The line this year is fairly well taken care of. And the backfield maintains, Blewett, Griffin, Jabs and Perrin perform well enough. But it is almost certain this quarter cannot go through the season without injury.

Price hasn't a backfield man on his string who can fill their shoes, unless one of them, despite inexperience, develops into a player of ability—and that rarely occurs, without experience. He has a quintet of prospects but their ability is almost an unknown quantity right now. They are Marcus, Clymer, Gill, Breckenridge and Dixon.

A pre-season summary of the Blue and Gold material seems to be that the Bears will have "Just a fair team." This, coupled with the fact that U. S. C.'s horde of former "prep" captains will be whipped into first team strength this year and "Pop" Warner's endless array of talent at Stanford, doesn't make things look any too encouraging for the Bears.

It will be nothing more or less than an off-told tale of lean years, when teams, carefully built through three or four seasons are shattered by graduation.

## DRIVERS ARE LIKE SOME BASEBALL PITCHERS; LOTS OF SPEED BUT NO CONTROL

"In my observations of automobile drivers, I am reminded of many bush leagues who have been tried out for places on the pitcher's box," said George O. Brandenburg, general manager of the Oregon State Motor Association. "In practically all instances with the pitchers, they were sent back to the 'stinks' through a lack of control. Wonderful speed they had, but no control. Now you get the point. Too many auto drivers have wonderful speed but lack control."

In analyzing the phrase as applied to auto driver, "Wonderful speed, but no control," Mr. Brandenburg pointed out that the lack of control was due to too much speed in most instances. When a car gets to a certain speed on ordinary traction as found on our highways, it is beyond control, and with our highways crossed by intersections, and vision obscured frequently by turns, there is ever a warning to be issued to the driver with wonderful speed but too little control. Even on a straightaway, a car becomes a hazard beyond a certain speed, as blowouts, or a dozen mishaps to the mechanism of the car will result in a spill that will not only endanger the lives of the occupants of the car but of those in the immediate vicinity of the unlucky one.

Strict attention to the path of the motor car is another item

**SOUTH BRND, Wash., Aug. 6.**—War on the destructive hair seal is to be waged by C. R. Pollack, state fish commissioner, in the Puget Sound region.

The seals are deadly enemies of salmon, destroying many thousands each year. The hair seal, it is said, takes one month out of a salmon just below the gills, then leaves the unfortunate fish to die. The seal works especially havoc inside fish traps, where it has little difficulty capturing salmon.

Pollack announced that he has engaged the Nelson brothers, famed hair seal hunters, to wage the campaign in the Puget Sound region. The brothers, Anton, Arthur, Ferdinand and Ed, are expected to make heavy inroads on the hundreds of hair seals that are to be found in waters of this region.
