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DIAMOND LAKE TO REMAIN AS OPEN RESORT

Effort to Include it in Crater Lake Park Defeated Last Night

VOTE IS UNANIMOUS

President's Commission Takes Action Following Medford Hearing

Ending a controversy of seven years standing, members of the president's coordinating commission last night voted to recommend that Diamond Lake shall not be included within Crater Lake National Park.

This decision was reached following a public hearing at Medford, during which 28 Jackson county residents testified, and urged that the Diamond Lake playground remain as it is at the present time. Two Ashland men helped to swell the preponderance of testimony against the proposed amalgamation. They were City Attorney William Briggs and E. T. Staples. Others from this city attended the hearing.

Kept for People
Under the decision of the commission, Diamond Lake will continue to remain under the jurisdiction of the forest service and will continue as the greatest trout egg-taking station in the United States.

Others who gave testimony at the Medford hearing included V. E. Allison, C. E. Gates, Mr. Bolton, Ralph Cogwell, Dr. Howard, Walter Bond, John Dennison, D. E. Kelly and O. M. Franklin. Mr. Kelly received a big hand when he declared that including Diamond Lake in the Crater Lake National Park would be like adding a mistletoe to a grand opera.

Speedy Decision
Following the closing of the public hearing, members of the commission retired to make their deliberations. Within five minutes they returned. They announced that they were of one mind; that they could see no reason for taking Diamond Lake away from the people and including it within Crater Lake National Park.

Ex-Sheriff Will Seek Judgeship At Klamath Falls

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Aug. 7.—William B. Barnes, former Klamath county sheriff, was last night nominated by the Klamath county Republican central committee to run for the office of justice of the peace, vacated by the death of R. E. Hunsaker. He is the father of Marion Barnes, game warden.

At the same meeting, John M. Glover was selected as choice of the committee for councilman from the Third ward at the coming city election. Glover is assistant cashier of the First National Bank.

Havana Murderer Dies on Garrote

HAVANA, Cuba, Aug. 7.—(UP)—Hernanda Pana, convicted of having assassinated the mayor of Santiago De Cuba in 1924, was executed on the garrote today. He remained calm and refused to name the men who are thought to have hired him.

M'PHERSON CASE IS OFFICIALLY CLOSED ADMITS PROSECUTOR

Los Angeles District Attorney Says he is Through With Probe

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 7.—Snowed under by a "barrage" of statements, the Aimee Semple McPherson kidnaping case was "officially closed" again today. The statements were as follows:

1—District Attorney Keyes asserted that all evidence obtained by his deputy, Joe Ryan, had been given the grand jury and further action rested with that body. In a separate statement which came as a surprise, he warned his office staff that discussion of any case handled by his office with newspapermen would result in dismissal.

2—Superior Judge Keetch declared in a statement that the grand jury had been too lax in keeping its findings and subsequent plans from the public.

3—Deputy District Attorney Ryan quieted rumors that he had broken with Keyes by praising the action of his chief throughout the McPherson case.

4—Early tonight no statement had been made by Mrs. McPherson, or her legal representatives.

SEVERAL ARE SLAIN IN RELIGIOUS WAR

Catholic Bishop Gives Out Statement Regarding Mexican Trouble

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 7.—(UP)—Bishop Pasqual of Tobacco last night gave out a written statement declaring that Catholics and several soldiers were killed in a battle at Guadalupe and 416 prisoners have been taken in "Chapel Jesus," during which two persons were killed and one wounded.

The statement added that the Catholics continued to defend their chapel.

PROSPECTIVE JUROR IS LOCATED IN JAIL

Man Shows Sheriff Why He Will Be Unable to Serve in Trial

SEATTLE, Aug. 7.—Although he wanted to serve on the Wallace C. (Bob) Gaines murder jury, D. B. Irving just couldn't get there. On the return slip, which accompanied his summons for jury duty, the man wrote:

"Will serve if permitted. D. B. Irving, see reverse side."

On the back of the slip Irving explained "would be glad to serve but will be confined in King county jail until September 4."

The prospective juror was not called for duty.

Curfew Law for Radios is Made

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—Midnight is curfew hour for radio receiving if you have neighbors who want to sleep. Magistrate Brosky has ruled in Jefferson Market court. John Covitt, defendant, asked if earphones would not solve the problem and got off with a suspended sentence, after being arrested with disturbing the peace.

AUTO SMASHUP IS FATAL FOR KINCAID BOY

Local Youth Dies in Medford Hospital Following Accident Here

HAD FRACTURED SKULL
Injured Youth Takes Sudden Turn For Worse and Death is Result

Harold Kincaid, 17-year-old Ashland boy who sustained a fractured skull in an automobile accident on July 24th, died late yesterday afternoon at the Sacred Heart hospital in Medford.

The boy appeared to be improving and strong hope had been held for his recovery, until he took a sudden turn for the worse. The body was brought to Ashland this morning by H. C. Stock.

Car Turns Over
The accident occurred near the Neil creek road when the light car driven by the boy left the pavement and crashed into a telephone pole as he was attempting to pass another car going in the same direction.

He was brought to the city where the first examination indicated a broken skull. The following day he was taken to the hospital at Medford and had been confined there until the time of his death.

The youth was the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Kincaid.

COUNTY AGENT WILL KEEP HIS POSITION

Clatsop Official Examined by Court After Thorough Probe

ASTORIA, Aug. 7.—(UP)—Public hearing and private investigation having exonerated E. W. McMinden of all charges brought against him, he will continue as county agricultural agent of Clatsop county and the petition signed by 125 persons asking his removal will be denied.

The announcement was made today by F. A. Ballard, state county agent leader. Mr. Ballard's decision supporting the county agent has been approved by the Oregon Agricultural College, and this morning was concurred in by the Clatsop county court.

Man Digs Way Out After Being Held Prisoner 7 Hours

REDDING, Cal., Aug. 7.—A. A. Anthony, mining engineer, was buried for seven hours in an abandoned mine tunnel north of here today. He was inspecting the shaft when a cave-in blocked the passage.

Anthony was unconscious for several hours but finally managed to dig his way out. A few moments after he had escaped a new slide of rock and earth blocked the passage again.

This treaty is regarded as being of vast importance.

MEDFORD MEN DEFEAT PLAN FOR BUILDING

Proposal to Purchase Building for Shrine Temple is Defeated

RETALIATION PLANNED
Local Members of the Order to Work Against County Seat Removal

General resentment was evidenced among Ashland Shriners this morning as the result of the action of Medford shriners last night in defeating the plan for purchasing the Chautauqua building from the city of Ashland and rebuilding it as a shrine temple for the Hillah temple shriners.

With but one or two exceptions the shriners from Medford, 25 strong, voted as a unit to halt all preliminary plans looking toward the financing of the local temple project. Several Grants Pass shriners also were reported to have the same views as those from Medford.

All Plans Stopped
As a result of the decisive vote, all activities in connection with the local temple were ordered stopped, and local members of the shrine expressed belief that the movement would not be revived for several years.

The proposal to purchase the Chautauqua building for the Hillah temple shrine originated among Medford shriners about three months ago. At that time the Medford shriners appeared to be strongly in favor of the plan, according to local members. A committee was appointed and all preliminary plans were taken up, preparatory to the financing of the project, which would have cost approximately \$30,000, including a complete remodeling of the building.

Change of Heart
But last night the Medford delegates appeared to have suffered a sudden change of heart, according to Ashland shriners, and because of this adverse vote, the preliminary work has gone for naught.

Because of the action of the Medford shriners, local members declared today that they are going to spike Medford's ambition to remove the county seat from Jacksonville to Medford, and will actively oppose the change in the forthcoming campaign.

As one member put it: "Medford is willing to play ball with us as long as Medford can stay at the bat. When Ashland asks for its inning it is a different matter, and we are determined to quit this one-sided game."

Grave Digger is Also Moonshiner

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 7.—(UP)—"You are digging your own grave," Federal Judge McCormick told William C. Harvey.

"I come well equipped, your honor, I'm a grave digger by profession."

"But you are in the complaint as a moonshiner," the judge said. "Well, I've done some of both," the defendant answered.

"Formerly dug graves—but after you've dug 'em, you don't care much what you do."

Judge McCormick suggested that it might be true, were the sequence reversed, and that in most cases the moonshine making precedes the digging.

Harvey confessed that he hadn't seen it in that grave light and was sentenced to 90 days.

Rooster Attacks San Diego Thief

SAN DIEGO, Aug. 7.—A henery thief was routed at the home of Mrs. Sam Bergman last night when a rooster made such a ferocious attack that the intruder tried to flee, with one eye nearly blinded. He was arrested in flight.

FATHER KILLED IN DUEL WITH HIS SON

Missouri Man Instantly Killed in Domestic Tragedy Yesterday

BISMARCK, Mo., Aug. 7.—(UP)—Challenging his father to a deadly duel, Edgar Campbell, aged 22, shot and killed his father, Capt. Ewing Campbell, aged 56, wealthy land owner, last evening. The young man stated that he was obliged to take action because his father had been abusing his mother. The son used a shotgun; the elder Campbell used a revolver. Three shots were fired. The father fell alone dead in his tracks.

Mail Robber is Returned to U. S. To Stand Trial

NE WYORK, Aug. 7.—Harry Sullivan, considered one of the most dangerous criminals on the Pacific coast, was brought back to the United States from London today for trial for an alleged holdup of a San Francisco mail truck, more than a year ago.

Sullivan, who was captured in London, where he fled following the alleged crime is reported to have subdued two guards single handed and looted mail sacks of securities and registered letters amounting to \$300,000.

Bachelors Will Be Barred Here

LONG ISLAND CITY, N. Y., Aug. 7.—The right of a bachelor to live in an apartment house planned for families is to be tested in the courts. William Houseman, apartment house owner, seeks to evict William Fuhrman, tenant, on the ground that Fuhrman represented himself as married. "I can't have bachelors or grass-widows in a family apartment house," Houseman insists.

Bank of France To Buy Up Gold

PARIS, Aug. 7.—The chamber of deputies by a vote of 385 to 141, has adopted Premier Poincare's bill authorizing the Bank of France to purchase foreign gold or notes and to issue corresponding amounts in notes.

To Admit Women In Eagles Lodge

SEATTLE, Aug. 7.—The thousands of women members of women's auxiliary are to be received into the Fraternal Order of Eagles for the first time in history.

ORDER HELPS IN WAR UPON RUM RUNNERS

Coast Guard Has Authority to Seize American Ships Anywhere

DECISION IS GIVEN
Proft Officials Believe Better Results Will Now Be Obtained

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—The coast guard prepared to launch a new offensive against rum runners as a result of a recent United States circuit court of appeals decision that American ships are under jurisdiction of United States laws anywhere in the world.

With this new powerful ruling and broader authority to enter British waters as provided in the anti-smuggling agreement perfected by Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Andrews with the English officials, the dry navy is expected to extend its activities into the very havens of the liquor smugglers.

Scouting Boats
Government patrol boats have been scouring the Atlantic and Pacific waters for bootleg convoys as far out as 100 miles, but unless the liquor ships came within 12 miles of shore they were not molested. Now, with the court ruling and the British agreement, all boats carrying the American flag and found operating illegally will be seized.

Attorney General Sargent today issued a statement confirming the court ruling. He pointed out "the laws of the land follow the flag."

To Seize Others
The coast guard also will resume its policy of seizing rum boats flying foreign flags caught within the 12-mile limit.

The government, Sargent said, will ask the supreme court to uphold lower judicial bodies authorizing forfeiture of the British rum ship Quadra. The Quadra was seized less than eight miles off San Francisco while unloading whiskey into motor boats.
