## PROHIBITION HELD WORSE THAN BOOZE

LONDON (UP)—Acts of Parliament cannot make people good.

This opinion was expressed through a questionnaire on the social problems in England, sent out by the Liberal Summer Schools, a semi-political organization, and answered by more than 800 associates and groups of various sorts.

Discussing prohibition of liquor sales, the response to the questionnaire showed a considerable sentiment supporting the criticism that prohibition creates new crimes of a sort easy to commit and tempting. This social harm done the state by creating new crimes, together with the hopelessness of making people good by Acts of Parliament, were emphasized as objectionable to prohibition.

The questionnaires, however, expressed the opinion that the absolute effects of drinking are considerable and that workers who do not drink are more efficient than those who do.

"But as to the relative effects upon productive efficiency of drinking, and of the creation of unrest by forcibly regulating the consumption of drink it is harder to judge," continued the report in which the answers to the questionnaire were compiled.

## TOURIST TRAVEL IS HEAVY THIS SEASON

The heavy tourist travel that is developing in Oregon is making this one of the busiest seasons ever experienced by the Oregon State Motor Association, said George O. Brandenburg, general manager of the State Motor branch of the A.A.A. upon his return from Central Oregon.

While in Central Oregon, Mr. Brandenburg, in company with Otto H. Jones, educational director of the motor association, made a set of motion pictures of the Century Drive, one of the scenic drives out of Bend. The trip was made into the Deschutes valley by way of the McKenzie River Highway which is one of the scenic highways of the Pacific Northwest. The return to Portland was made by way of the Wapinitia Cutoff which leaves The Dalles-California Highway at Maupin and strikes the Mount Hood Loop Highway about five miles south of Government Camp.

This cutoff is in good gravelled macadam condition with the exception of 31 miles. This stretch is dirt road that is in good condition with the exception of approximately 4 miles that are rutted and cut up as a result of construction work that is being carried on about five miles out of Wapinitia. With the completion of the road that is now under construction, this cutoff will become extremely popular as it gives the tourist an opportunity to motor over the greater part of the Mount Hood Loop and strike the Columbia Highway at Hood River and then enter Portland by way of the Columbia River Highway.

This routing gives one the opportunity of seeing the Mount Hood Loop and the Columbia River Highway, two of the grand scenic highways of the Pacific Northwest in entering Portland from the south. If a tourist is in a hurry they may motor directly into Portland from Government Camp making the entire distance from Bend to Portland, 263 miles which cuts off a material distance from the route of The Dalles-California Highway.

Messrs. Brandenburg and Jones left immediately upon their return from Central Oregon districts to cover the John Day Highway. This highway will be logged and photographed at its interesting points by the two motor officials, and tourist travel stimulated over it as much as possible.

## INDIAN IS SEEKING BIG CACHE OF GOLD

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 7.—(UP)—Gun-a-Noot, Northern British Columbia Indian of romantic experience, is guiding the lawyer, Stuart Henderson, to a destination hidden 690 miles in the hinterland where tribal legend says gold lies buried, untouched by the hand of white man.

Gun-a-Noot and Stuart Henderson have been fast friends since a day in the spring of 1919, when the Indian, for 13 years "wanted" on a double murder charge, paid the lawyer a professional visit at Victoria.

For 13 years a fugitive from justice, which had spent nearly \$50,000 in an effort to apprehend him, Gun-a-Noot said he would give himself up, if Henderson would defend him.

Indian chiefs participated in the final negotiations. Then on June 20, 1919, Gun-a-Noot surrendered to face the crown's accusation that he killed 13 years before, Alex McIntosh and Max Leclair.

Gun-a-Noot was tried and acquitted the following October in Vancouver, on the charge of murdering McIntosh. The crown dropped the second charge.

Stuart Henderson, who won the Indian's acquittal, earned not only the gratitude of Gun-a-Noot, but that of all the Indians of the northern tribes.

The gold-seeking expedition into the hinterland is the result. The Indians have imparted to the lawyer a vast fund of information, some believed authentic, some legendary.

If successful, the quest will lead to a virgin field of gold as yet untouched by the prospector's pick.

## AMERICAN TOURISTS FROVE EASY MARKS

LONDON (UP)—The "cheaty trick", one of the oldest stock-in-trade hoaxes of confidence men, recently cost an American tourist \$500 here.

The trick, which netted great profits to confidence men on the Continent following the World War, is usually played in the most prominent hotels and restaurants mainly to mislead the victim.

One or two very engaging persons approach the victim and enquire if he is a visitor. They usually pose as visitors who are lonely and seeking companionship. Then they tell their story.

The father or uncle of one of the men was very wealthy and recently died in Chicago, leaving vast sums to charity in England, with the designation that the "son or nephew" distribute the money for him. They display a full page—ordinarily stuffed with paper—and engage in a conversation about "honesty."

The bearer of the pocketbook turns to the victim and declares that he has an honest face and that although his purse contains \$20,000 he would be willing to allow the man completely out of sight with it. The victim takes the purse and walks around the block—remembering that he is an honest man and must not look inside the purse.
