A REMEDY FOR CROSSING ACCIDENTS

Prevention of grade crossing accidents is so easy and simple that there is no excuse for such accidents. All that is necessary, is to look in both directions to see whether a train is approaching. If a train is approaching, stop, and let it go by.

When there is more than one track, wait after a train has passed, to make sure that another train is not approaching on one of the other tracks.

Where a crossing does not afford good vision, because of view being obstructed by buildings, trees, curves or embankments, stop, look and listen before crossing.

When signals are in action, crossing gates lowered or flagman is at crossing, train is approaching, and driver should stop, and let it pass.

These are reasonable regulations. If observed, they will prevent grade crossing accidents just as effectively as grade changes. When not observed, the driver's license should be canceled.

In other words, by such regulations, crossing accidents can be averted without loading up municipalities with taxes for grade changes.

OIL INDUSTRY CARRIES TAX BURDEN

In all probability, no levy of ad valorem taxes for purposes of state government will be necessary in Oklahoma this year, because of the surplus created by the increased amount of money collected from the gross production tax on oil and minerals.

This type of special taxation is a great thing for everybody but the party being taxed.

The various taxes now assessed against the oil industry (which gasoline users have to pay) aggregate a staggering amount. They are the result of an effort to raise tax funds, not by equal taxation of all persons and industries, but by taxation of certain industries least able to resist payment.

As one large industry after another is gradually taxed the limit by special taxes, smaller industries will become the target of the "special tax gun."

The basic principle of "equal taxation" has been lost sight of, but it will eventually have to be revived, if sound government is maintained.

NOT A THEORY, BUT A FACT

Commenting on the political attempts to break down the tariff to "help" the farmer, or to pass laws to lift the farmers by their own boot straps, the San Francisco Chronicle says:

"The farmer, more interested at the movement in the growing of his crops than in what is to become of them finally, is the victim of political hocus-pocus that keeps him standing still. Industry declines to be taken in by such tactics any more. It does not blame a political party for the weather, and is vigilant on all fronts."

Breaking down the tariff at the expense of American industry, would destroy the best market the farmer has. Protect all industry, including agriculture, by reasonable tariff laws which give our workers and farmers an even break with cheap labor-foreign competition.

This may sound less interesting than "revolving funds" and other weird "fama relief" measures offered, but it will work.

WHAT GAS WILL DO

Illustrative of possibilities of the gas industry is the statement of the Peoples' Gas Light & Cook Co., that 1,000 cubic feet of gas will: Prepare 18 meals for six persons; heat shaving water for 1,000 days; roast enough coffee to make two cups a day for 70 years; light two cigars a day for 500 years; boil 275 gallons of water; bake 1,000 three-quarter-pound loaves of bread in a Perkins continuous oven; prepare 330 single restaurant meals; roast enough cocoa beans for 45,000 cups; do the work of two hens in hatching eggs; broil 70 three-pound steaks; barbecue enough ham to make 1,750 sandwiches.

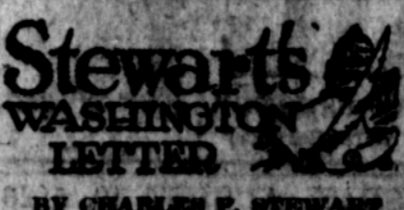

Stewart's WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON — Senator William E. Borah, chairman, and his fellow members of the senate committee on investigation of the alien property custodian's office seem to be in for a busy summer.

The alien property custodian's records never have had a thorough overhauling and their volume is tremendous.

If there has been graft, as Borah expects to show, it's quite on the cards that it was on a record scale, for the sums the custodian has handled have been comparable to the hoards in the United States treasury.

"Millions" is Borah's rough estimate of the amount he believes stuck to somebody's fingers. For legal advice alone \$3,000,000 appears to have been spent. This may or may not have been too much but Borah thinks it was.

Ex-Custodian Thomas W. Miller and ex-Attorney General Nathan M. Dougherty probably will have to bear the brunt of things when the investigators really get down to cases.

Both are under indictment in New York in connection with one of the custodian's turnovers, but that was just a single transaction. Borah expects to dig into thousands.

Even if the explanations are all satisfactory there will have to be a great many of them.

Borah doesn't like the idea of an alien property custodian's office, anyway.

He doesn't consider it right to seize private property even in time of war, and with billions of our own invested abroad now, he ventures the guess that, the next time we get into one, we'll wish we hadn't set such a precedent.

At any rate he says the seized property ought to be returned, now the war's over, and he adds most emphatically that the custodian and his friends ought not to have gobbled any of it up—if they did—while it was in the government's possession.

Grandmother is Summer Student

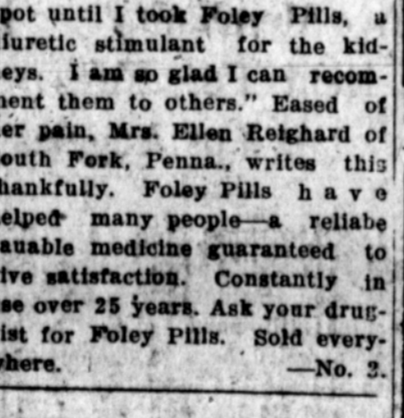

will have a North exposure and be constructed in no manner of accident can direct the stored water back into the creek. These basins must be entirely concrete construction and we will supply the amounts of water for all time to come.

This system will be worth all it will cost. It will settle the question of where are we to get the water we need. It will minimize contamination or the possibility of it, as we will get our water supply from a close area that can be entirely under the control of the City; probably no other equal sized area in the state of Oregon has the same production of fine water that can be controlled so easily.

The basic principle of this plan is that we have the water, as this water is supplied during the months when there is an abundance, and the policy should be unwaveringly established in the minds of this community that this is the water we have and this is the water we are constructing a system for, inasmuch as it gets us as far away from the uncertainties of dry summer months, which, with the cutting of timber and destruction from forest fires that will not lessen the future menace from sole dependence on creek flow throughout the year, no matter what source we get it from.
