## MAID TESTIFIES IN HALL MURDER TRIAL

**Edith Hainey of Pastor and Choir Singer is Related**  
**SOMERVILLE, N. J., Aug. 18.**—(UP)—Intimacy between Rev. Edward Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Mills was described late yesterday by Barbara Tough, former domestic in the pastor's home. Testifying in the preliminary examination of Willie Stevens and Henry De LaBruyere Carver, who, with Mrs. Hall, are charged with the murder, Miss Tough said she saw Mrs. Mills sitting on the pastor's lap in the study of the church rectory a few months before the double murder.

## Hair of Woman Centuries Ago Is Found in England

**LONDON, (UP)**—Perfectly preserved after 1900 years under ground, a quantity of Roman remains have been dug up in Mill Lane, near London Bridge, during excavation work for a new building. The relics are considered of the Londinium of the Romans, the earliest beginnings of modern London.  
 A Roman lady's wooden comb, delicately carved and with a few strands of fine black hair still caught in it, was found by the workmen, so well preserved that it seemed almost new.  
 Near it was found an iron stylus, an instrument used by the Romans to write on tablets. Though it had been buried for eighteen centuries, there was no fleck of rust upon it and the writing point and erasing edge were as sharp as they probably had been when the stylus last slipped from the fingers of its Roman possessor.  
 A quantity of Samian ware, dating from the last half of the first century after Christ, and a small statuette of pipeclay, supposed by experts to represent Venus and of the sort used for household decoration by the Romans, also were unearthed by the astonished workmen.

## THREAT OF MURDER ON BROOKHART'S LIFE

**IF LOVE FORGIVES HE WILL BE KILLED**  
**ONDAR RAPIDS, Mich., Aug. 18.**—(UP)—Threats to Mill Smith W. Brookhart should he speak as scheduled at the Marion fair this afternoon are contained in two letters received by Marion citizens. One letter was received by F. C. H. Schmitke, Marion druggist, who is scheduled to introduce Brookhart. The letter said: "Brookhart is a socialist and so are you or you wouldn't introduce him. If Brookhart carries out his scheduled speech this afternoon he will be a dead man."

## Pioneer Journal Of Lake County Ceases to Exist

**LAKEPORT, Cal., Aug. 18.**—The Clear Lake Press, pioneer paper of Lake county, is no more, after an honored existence in the publishing field since 1835.  
 Changing times brought changing tastes, even in this largest California county without a railroad, and a disastrous fire last April was the last straw.  
 The press and other equipment was dismantled and has just been shipped to San Francisco and Sacramento.

## Bridge Torn Out By Flow of Mud

**PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 18.**—(UP)—The White River bridge on the Mt. Hood loop road, seven miles from Government Camp, was carried away by a mud flow, according to a telephone message here. Loop traffic will be suspended until the flood subsides and temporary repairs can be made.

## Banker's Brother Succumbs At Sea

**NEW YORK, Aug. 18.**—Charles Chouney Stillman, brother of James A. Stillman, banker, died at sea yesterday, aboard the liner Aquitania. It was learned in wireless reports. Acute appendicitis caused death.

## Manila Official Ordered Banished

**MANILA, Aug. 18.**—Rosario Almaro, member of the Manila municipal board has been sentenced to banishment for two years to a place not nearer than 15 miles to Manila for slandering another member of the board at a public session of that body last June. His conviction also carried a fine of \$100.

## Restrictions Urged

Property owners along the boulevard appeared before the council and urged the passage of a zoning ordinance in order to place restrictions on buildings which may be constructed in that residential district. It was brought out that such an ordinance is now nearly ready and the ordinance committee was instructed to present it at the next meeting of the council.  
 Residents of Bellview appeared in some numbers to register a vigorous protest against the city purchasing the Archie Miller property in that district for use as a dump ground. They declared it would be extremely harmful to property in that section. The purchase of the land was held up for the time being, and the Bellview folks were given assurance that they would be notified before any definite action is taken.  
 An ordinance assessing levies on the normal school sidewalk improvement district was ready for the first time and placed on the calendar.  
 Councilman Burdick urged that the police be instructed to place signs adjacent to all hotels, notifying tourists that all-night parking in the streets is prohibited. Councilman Taylor urged that one-way traffic signs be placed at the plaza. Both these recommendations were adopted by the council.
