## RAIL PAGEANT AT EUGENE IS DRAWING CARD

**Parade Typifying Early Days in Oregon Proving Today's Attraction**

**VISITORS ARRIVING**  
**Industrial Parade Will Be Held Tomorrow At the Big Celebration**

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 19.—(UP)—Pioneers of early days of Oregon paraded here today, celebrating the completion of the main line of the Southern Pacific railroad from Eugene to California, via the Natron cut-off.

The parade was made up of 111 entries, each typifying the spirit of the pioneers who faced the wilderness in the early days of Oregon. All entries were drawn either by horses or oxen.

Motor vehicles are being reserved for the civic and industrial parade which will be held tomorrow. Crowds are continuing to swarm into Eugene from all points in Oregon and it is expected that nearly 10,000 visitors will be here by tonight.

## ARMY STARTS PROBE OF ARSENAL BLAZE

**Nobody Injured During Explosion Last Night at Pig Point, Va.**

WASHINGTON, S. C., Aug. 19.—(UP)—A committee to investigate the Big Point, Va., army arsenal fire last night, was named by the War Department today and directed to proceed to the scene immediately.

The department minimized the fire in a statement issued following the receipt of a complete report. No explosion occurred, and it is thought it was caused from lightning. There were no deaths and no persons were injured, although several were temporarily blinded as a result of flashes of flaming powder.

## Search Starts for Escaped Murderer

JOLIET, Ill., Aug. 19.—A statewide hunt extended tonight for Thomas Langford, murder convict, who saved his way out of the new penitentiary near here. When his cell was first discovered empty, officials believed Langford was hiding inside the prison walls but a thorough search failed to locate him.

## SITES FOR STORAGE DAM IN CANYON ARE UNDER INSPECTION

**City Council to Hold Special Meeting Tonight After Trip**

Mayor Johnson, all members of the city council, together with engineers, Water Superintendent Hoeller and other city officials are today making an investigation of Ashland creek canyon for the purpose of determining, if possible, on a site for the projected storage dam which it is hoped will be constructed next year.

Following their all-day visit to the various sites up the canyon, the council will hold a special meeting tonight. It is possible it will authorize a special water bond election for early next month, asking authority from the voters to issue \$500,000 in bonds for extensions and improvements to the municipal water system.

Primarily, the meeting tonight is for the purpose of issuing a special election call to provide \$500,000 for the city street fund. The need for this sum at once is held imperative, but with the water question fresh on their minds, and with many citizens urging immediate action on the water election, it is possible that some definite steps will be taken.

## ESCAPING YOUTH IS KILLED BY POLICE

**Frank Foy Dead From Policeman's Bullet in San Francisco**

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 19.—Frank Foy, 21, was killed, and Frank Gogin, 20, was wounded by a policeman yesterday, when they refused to surrender after complaint had been made of their conduct toward several little girls in a local theatre.

The youths fled when the theatre manager called Policeman Joseph Dermming, and the officer followed them to a lumber yard, firing as he ran. At Mission emergency hospital, where the men were taken, Foy was found dead. Gogin will recover.

## MILLIONS OF TROUT SECURING FREEDOM

**Dry Spell and Low Water Causes Emergency in Hatchery Work**

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 19.—Millions of trout fry in Oregon's hatcheries have been liberated in order to save their lives as a result of unusually warm weather and shortage of water.

M. L. Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries, reported that 1,000,000 fry were freed from the Delphi creek hatchery alone.

## GIRLS ADVISED TO BE MORE CAUTIOUS

**Resolution Against Paris Convention Will Be Introduced**

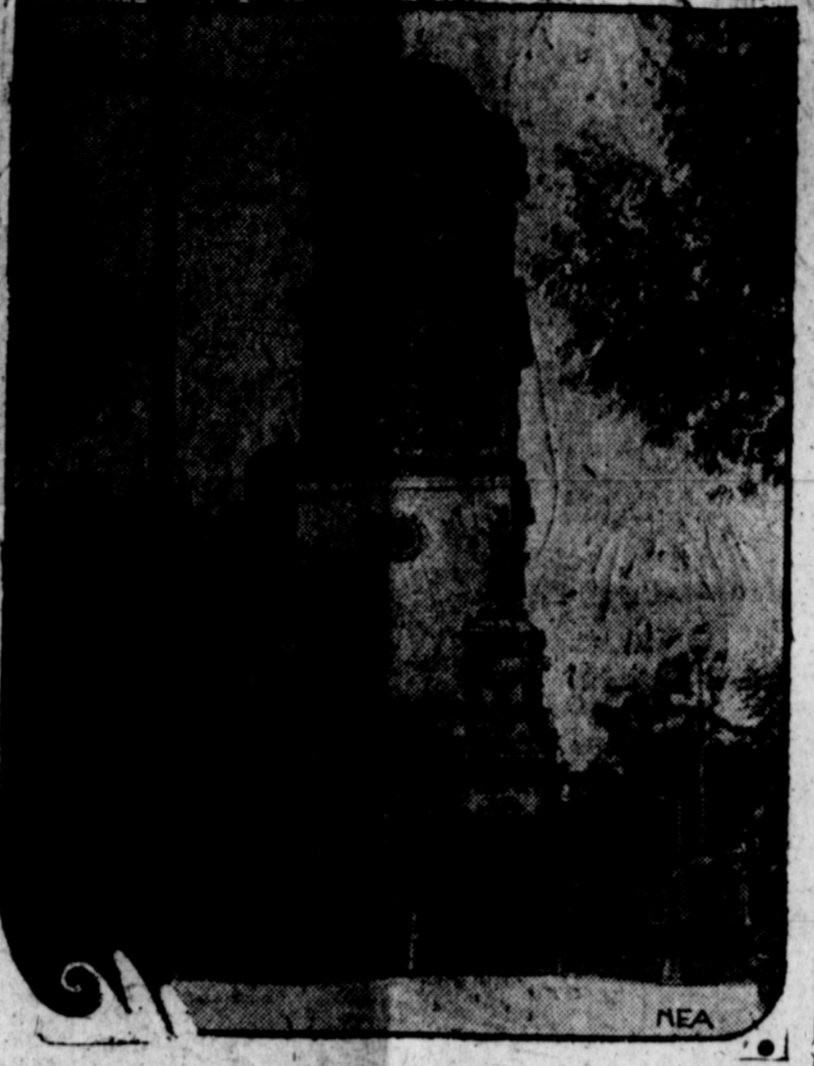
LONGVIEW, Wash., Aug. 19.—(UP)—The same resolution that plagued the Oregon American Legion convention at Marshfield, that of opposing the national convention at Paris next year, arose in the Washington veterans' annual convention here today. The resolution will be formally introduced tomorrow by John Paul Jones post of Seattle.

"I fought the officers and tried to jump in because they were abusive. The language they used would make anybody want to jump into the lake," she said.

**Death List in Air Disaster Near London Raised to Three**

LONDON, Aug. 19.—(UP)—Pilot Pierre De Lisle of the French air union plane which fell yesterday, died today in a hospital at Folkestone, raising the death list to three, including one American, one Italian and one Frenchman. Nine Americans were injured when the plane fell at Romney Marshes while enroute.

## LEGION WILL SEEK VOTING IN NOVEMBER

**Meetings Through Will Be Held on the 21st of September**

**PLAN WINS APPROVAL**  
**At Least Ten Million Voters Will Be Reached By Movement**

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 19.—Civic associations, patriotic organizations, religious societies, and clubs of business and professional men and women are responding favorably by every mail to the appeal made by the American Legion for a nationwide movement in support of 11,000 meetings September 21, to arrange for non-partisan committees of representatives of various organizations to get out the vote at the general election November 2, according to Frank C. Cross, National Director of the American Legion.

"Working in conjunction with the National Civic Federation, an appeal was sent to 11,000 posts of the American Legion requesting that local Legionnaires call the meetings September 21 at which representative citizens be invited to participate in awakening the duties of voters, not only to vote November 2, but to take active part in the caucuses of their respective parties.

Cooperation Pledged

"The appeal has been heard and active cooperation promised and started. Most of the associations have issued bulletins to their members to cooperate to the fullest extent with the Legion posts. Among these organizations are the Kiwanis International, the Rotary, the D. A. R., the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the National League of Women Voters, the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, the Knights of Columbus, the Junior Chamber of Commerce of the United States, the Elks, the Grand Council of the Order of Demolay, the Military Order of the World War, the National Council of Traveling Salesmen's Associations, the National Electric Light Association, the Sons of the Revolution, the United Engineering Society, the Reserve Officers' Association of the United States, and scores of others.

Many Interested

"We estimate that at least ten million voters have become interested through the national organizations that have taken up our appeal and placed it before their memberships, not counting the three-quarter of a million Legionnaires."

## FARMER IS ACCUSED OF STEALING WATER

**Wasco County Man Arrested For Taking Irrigation Water**

THE DALLES, Aug. 19.—(UP)—A warrant charging M. M. Burner, prominent grange worker and one of the sponsors of the state market road law, with unlawful using of the water of Eight mile creek for irrigating his lands after it had been denied him by Water Master T. Leland Brown, was sworn out in the local justice court today. Complaint was made by T. Wilson as private prosecutor, violations of water rulings have been numerous in Wasco county this year. Conviction carried with it a heavy fine or jail sentence.

## PRIESTS REPORTED SLAIN IN FIGHTING

**MEXICO CITY Has Rumor of Another Clash in Religious War**

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 19.—(UP)—Wholly unconfirmed reports emanating from Catholic circles today said several priests had been killed in the state of Guerrero in fighting growing out of the struggle between the church and the state. Official confirmation of the dispatches is being sought by officials here.

**MARYSVILLE, Calif., Aug. 19.—Modern day science is doing much to take away the romance and danger of old-time pursuits. ## MOTHER'S PLEA IS GRANTED - BOY WINS LIFE IMPRISONMENT

**Donald Ringer, Age 19, Will Not Hang For the Murder of Mfan**

LINCOLN, Neb., Aug. 19.—A poor mother's plea to the governor's wife has saved her 19-year-old boy from death in the electric chair.

Donald Ringer, convicted of murdering Carl Moore, an automobile salesman and sentenced to be executed, received a commutation of sentence to life imprisonment today from the state pardon board. Donald's case would never have reached the board save for the quick thinking of his mother. Twelve hours before he was to be electrocuted a month ago, Mrs. Ringer called Governor McMullen's wife on the telephone and induced her to intervene with her husband in the governor's behalf. Two hours later the governor issued a stay of execution, sending the boy for Donald's appeal to the board of pardons. His death sentence was commuted on the grounds of his extreme youth—the same plea that saved Leo and Leopold, the Chicago slayers of lobby F.anks.

## MURDER PROBE WILL SWITCH TO CANTON

**Federal Sleuths to Concern Selves Only With the Liquor End**

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 19.—(UP)—The scene of the Don R. Mellett murder investigation was transferred to Canton this morning with the announcement by District Attorney Bernstein that federal authorities will concern themselves henceforth only with the resulting liquor problem.

Evidence which has thus far been uncovered in the murder case will be taken directly to the Stark county grand jury.

## DISTRICT ATTORNEY WILL PROBE CHARGES

**Corrupt Practice Complaint Against Steiwer Is Considered**

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 19.—(UP)—Investigation into charges against Frederick Steiwer by W. S. U'Ren, alleging improper campaign accounting, is under consideration by District Attorney John Carson of Marion county.

Carson today received a letter from John R. Latourette of Portland, treasurer for Steiwer's campaign, denying all charges and demanding an investigation. Carson has not yet decided what action he will take regarding the demand.

## BUDGET PLAN HELPS YOUNG FOLKS START

**Federal Official Says It Is One Safe Start on Marriage**

**TESTIMONIALS GIVEN**  
**Housewives Declare Monthly Budget Is Sure Way To Save Money**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—(UP)—Adopt a family expense budget and you will do much to insure a successful marriage, Chase G. Woodhouse, of the U. S. Bureau of Home Economics, advises home makers in a bulletin just published.

Scores of letters from housewives from all parts of the country telling of family troubles and asking for information on planning home expenses have been received by the bureau. In response to these pleas the bureau issued the budget plan.

The First Step

"In order to spend wisely," the bulletin stated, "you must know what you have to spend. The first step in making your budget is to estimate your income. Next list every expenditure. Set aside something for the 'rainy day' and take out insurance enough to care for the family.

"Now compare the totals of the two lists—your estimated income and your estimated expenditures. For safety the expenditures should be somewhat under the income. Go over the expenditures until this margin appears. You may find some extravaganzas if you look for them, especially in your small expenditures."

Monthly Basis

The budget plan operates best on a monthly basis, it was advised. Apportion the income according to the budget. Write down each day just how much has been expended in order to be certain of the total at the end of the month. Give each member of the family an allowance for personal expenses.

The bulletin urges "do not make your recording of expenditures a family nuisance, the main subject of conversation at the evening meal.

"It is not necessary to account for every penny. It is not how much you have to spend but how you spend it and what you get for it that is important. Knowing this you can spend more advantageously next month."

## SAN FRANCISCO IS PLANNING REGATTA

**SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17.—(UP)—San Francisco, affectionately designated by many visitors within its gates as "the city that knows how," is planning a reception to the fourth annual Pacific Coast Yachting regatta, August 21 to 29, that will be equal in brilliance to the brilliance of the event itself.**

The regatta, according to plans nearing completion, will be the greatest in this phase of maritime history of the Pacific coast.

More than 200 yachts, representing 14 clubs between San Diego and Vancouver, B. C., will be assembled. The regatta will receive official recognition of the United States navy through the presence of the entire battle fleet, composed of nearly one hundred ships, including battleships, destroyers, submarines, airplane carriers and ships of the train, headed by the U. S. S. Scattle, flagship of Admiral S. S. Robison.

The fleet will arrive August 19. On August 26 cutters from all the battleships will compete in a race for the Olympic club challenge cup, one of the most prominent scheduled events of the regatta. The day of August 31 will be dedicated jointly to the battle fleet and to San Francisco.
