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## FOSTER WILL AGAIN VISIT OWENS VALLEY

Land Settlement Chief Is To Urge Farmers To Locate in Oregon

**PROSPECTS ARE GOOD**  
Many Ranchers Plan to Look For New Homes in Next 2 Weeks

Farmers of the Owens Valley country near Los Angeles will be starting out with the next three weeks looking for new locations, and Arthur Foster of the Oregon land settlement bureau is leaving Ashland this evening for Bishop and other points in Owens Valley in a determined effort to bring many of these prospective settlers to this state.

When Mr. Foster and F. M. Carter went to Owens Valley early this summer they succeeded in interesting many farmers there in Oregon. They were told, however, that they would not start forth until the last of August and first of September, and Mr. Foster's trip is being made for the purpose of again extolling Oregon's agricultural lands.

Three families from the Owens Valley country have come to Oregon and purchased farm homes within the past 30 days. Two of these families located in Jackson county and are urging many of their friends in the south to inspect this section before they decide to locate elsewhere.

Mr. Foster will be gone about two weeks and will interview a large number of farmers who have sold their property to the city of Los Angeles as a result of the water litigation which has been carried on in Owens Valley for several years.

The accident brought official attention to badly worn equipment. The mint, so substantially constructed in 1874, has withstood the 1906 fire and earthquake. The 30 foot columns in front of the edifice were brought from British Columbia and remain among the finest examples of single piece stone columns on the Pacific coast.

## NEW NORMAL SCHOOL CATALOG IS MAILED THROUGHOUT OREGON

All Facts Concerning Fall Session Included in Booklet

Churchill, and is now being mailed to prospective students in every section of Oregon. The catalog contains 30 pages of material, both descriptive of Ashland and vicinity, as well as a complete synopsis of all studies available at the state's new normal school.

The first fall and winter term will open September 27, with registration on that day and regular class work starting the following day. The first quarter closes December 17th, and Christmas holidays will begin on that date and continue until Jan. 3. The second quarter will start January 2 and continue until June 17th, and the fourth quarter, or summer session will continue from June 30 to Sept. 2, next year.

The catalog contains photographs of Lithia park and Lake of the Woods, as well as pictures of new normal building and new Lincoln grade school. Descriptive articles telling of the scenic attractions of this part of the state are also included.

## SHASTA TRAIN TO GO BY WAY OF NEW ROUTE

Fast Passenger Train Over S. P. Will Be Routed By Klamath

**WILL HAVE SIX HOURS**  
Traffic Mgr. Says Change Will Be Made in A Short Time

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Aug. 21.—"Shasta Limited," famous fast palatial train between San Francisco and Portland and the ace train of the Southern Pacific system, will be routed through Klamath Falls over the new Cascade line. This was clearly indicated by F. S. McGinnis, passenger traffic manager of the Southern Pacific who, with many other high officials of the rail concern, passed through Klamath Falls yesterday afternoon on a special train.

No Question  
"There can hardly be any question about the Shasta, even though definite decision has not been reached," Mr. McGinnis explained. "That train, above all others, will be routed over the line that will be the shortest. From Portland to San Francisco by way of the new Cascade line and through Klamath Falls, it is between five and six hours shorter than the old way through Roseburg, Medford and the Siskiyou. So I think it is an assured fact that the Shasta will come this way. So far as the other trains are concerned, no decision has yet been reached."

## LAKE OF WOODS IS NOT DISAPPEARING

**Figure Is Nothing New, According To Report of Forest Officer**  
There is a strange phenomenon in the water disappearing through a fissure in Lake of the Woods, according to a report received today by Deputy Game Warden Roy Parr from forest officials who went to the lake to investigate following a sensational report from Klamath Falls that the lake is drying up.

The fissure has always been in the lake and water has been emptying out through it, the report stated. The fact that the water is so low because of the long continued dry spell made this fissure visible. Water from springs and mountain streams flow into the lake, and this famed mountain resort will be back to normal as soon as the fall rains start, it was declared.

## Huge All-Metal Airship Planned

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—Contracts for construction of the first all-metal airship ever built were awarded today by the navy department to the Aircraft Development corporation of Detroit, a firm with which Edsel Ford is prominently identified. Acting Secretary Warren announced.

The new dirigible, the first of its kind, will cost \$200,000 and was provided for in the naval aircraft bill passed by the last congress. The Aircraft Development corporation was the only bidder.

## HUERTA TO BE PUT TO DEATH IS PROPHECY

Ex-President of Mexico May Face Firing Squad in Short Time

**PLOT FALLS THROUGH**  
Attempt to Overthrow Government May Result in Drastic Action

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 20.—Agustín de la Huerta, former president of Mexico, may face a firing squad in connection with the planned attempt to overthrow the Calles government, it was intimated here late today. While Lucien C. Wheeler, chief of the department of justice here, refused to discuss the findings of federal agents working on the case, the former Mexican president's name is understood to be definitely linked with the frustrated plot.

It is reported that the investigation of agents here tends to show that de la Huerta was the "brains" of the revolutionary movement and that action is already under way to bring about his extradition to Mexico. A technical charge of "misappropriation of funds while president" would be used in the extradition proceedings and de la Huerta declared a fugitive. Washington would then be asked to send him to Mexico City. De la Huerta is now living in San Antonio, Texas.

Treason Charged  
Such action, if successful, would lead to a trial in connection with the revolutionary movement. It is believed here, that would end with de la Huerta facing a firing squad. While activities in the Mexican colony continued as authorities sought enlisted "soldiers" known to have been recruited to join General Enrique Estrada, John Carr, head of the local immigration bureau, left for San Diego. He will investigate the status of all men being held and those found to be aliens will be ordered deported.
