WOMEN AS GOOD AS MEN IN BUSINESS

Loplin (AP)—Viscountess Rhonda, who is a director in 28 important companies, refused to believe that women as a whole are either better or worse suited to business than men. She was recently elected president of the Institute of Directors, the first woman to hold the position.

"It is purely an individual matter," she said of women in business. "It is impossible to generalize. There has been a big development recently and signs of general awakening to the idea of women working side by side with men in business. This is a good thing, I believe, for the commercial world and for the nation as a whole. In a country where business and trade are premier factors you want to recruit the whole of the business ability of the country instead of only half."

Sir John Cockburn, inaugurating Lady Rhonda as president of the Institute of Directors, said that women generally are more even-tempered and more business-like than men.

"They do not rise to such heights of disastrous imagination or sink to such depths of despair and they are less likely to plunge," he said. Lady Rhonda did not agree with him.

There are now more than two hundred women acting as directors of important business concerns in England, Lady Rhonda said. She is, in her own words, keen to see women admitted to the Stock Exchange.

THESE NATIVES ARE ONE CONTENTED LOT

KINGS RAY, Spitzbergen (UP)—Happy residents of these islands, only 800 miles from the North Pole laugh when strangers speak of Spitzbergen as the rim of the earth. To them the real "old north" is many miles further on, among the nameless settlements near Point Morris Jessup, Greenland. There people among the strangest in the world, live in primitive conditions known nowhere else.

Commander Byrd, before his flight to the Pole, planned to establish his base among these Eskimos, who number two or three hundred. He may go there in the summer of 1927. If so, he will find them as Peary left them years ago—dirty, hostile and profoundly content.

Peary was the first man really to become acquainted with them and live to bring back the story. His ship wintered several times at Point Morris Jessup, and some of the natives accompanied him to the United States.

Mrs. Peary also took along a girl, Takrisuaik, who was called "Bill" and exposed for a while to all the advantages of civilization.

The Peary Eskimo joined for their igloos and frozen walrus meat, and went home. Two of them became permanent in the tribe merely by reason of the tall stories they told. They were used by one Samik, however, who became a pilot when Peary gave him a motor launch in which to fish.

Through his wealth, Samik won the hand of "Bill", who after her stay abroad was regarded as the tribe's choicest piece.

As the stories go, Mrs. Samik proved a good wife, unspoiled by her sojourn in the southlands. The last traveler to see her said she had forgotten all her civilized ways and was no more squeamish about what went into the stew than any of her sisters who had not had the advantages of a fine
