THE NEW WORLD BEGINNING

According to Mr. Bohnert, of New York City, who spoke at the Wimer hall, yesterday, we are living at a time when a new order of things is being introduced.

"This new order of things," he said, "is referred to in the Bible as a new world. It will be so different from the world in which we have lived in the past, although the earth will be the same, that it is sometimes spoken of as a new earth, using that expression in a figurative or symbolical sense. The beginning of a new world, then, means simply a change in the affairs of men, but a change so far-reaching as to overturn and eliminate all existing institutions to make way for better and grander conditions.

"The Bible, in the third chapter of the Apostle Peter's second letter, points out that the new world, or order of things, is to be a permanent one, and shows further that there have been two other 'worlds' which were not permanent. He states, 'The world that then was, being overflowed with water, perished.' This, of course, does not refer to the literal earth, for we still live upon the same planet. It means that the order of things which existed before the flood ceased when the deluge came. We have the assurance in the book of Ecclesiastes (1:4) that the earth abides forever, and in the forty-fifth chapter of Isaiah, verse eighteen, we are informed that God did not create the earth in vain, but that he formed it to be inhabited. It is therefore clear that the passing away of a world does not mean the destruction of the earth. So when we read in Peter's letter that the heavens and the earth which are the day of judgment, we are prepared to look for an interpretation in harmony with the Scriptures, which plainly tell us that the earth is not to be destroyed.

"As the expression 'earth' refers to the social order in human affairs, so the term 'heavens' has reference to a controlling spiritual organization under the super-control of the master mind of Satan. It is for this reason that he is called 'the god of this world.' But what does Peter mean when he refers to a destructive fire? Does this mean that God intends to wipe out the human family by fire, as the flood destroyed it at the end of the first world? No, indeed, for God promised that he would not again destroy every living thing as at that time. (Gen. 8:21) What then does it mean? Turn to Zephaniah 3:8-9, which clarifies the matter. We there read: 'Wait ye upon me, saith the Lord, until the day that I rise up to the prey; for my determination is to gather the nations that I may assemble the kingdoms, to pour upon them mine indignation: . . . for all the earth shall be devoured with the fire of my jealousy. For then will I turn to the people a pure message, that they may all call upon the name of the Lord, to serve him with one consent.' It will be seen from this passage that after the fire has done its purifying work, the people remain and are given the message of truth which leads to a harmonious worship of God. The fire simply refers to a period of trouble and distress through which the world passes before the introduction of the new order of things, the beginning of the new world in which right will rule. "But what further evidence"

have we that the new world is now beginning? The new world begins as the old passes away. We have abundant proof that the old order of things is giving away to a new arrangement. The 24th chapter of Matthew gives us a remarkable prophecy relating to our day. The disciples of Jesus had asked him as to what would be the proof of his second presence, of the passing away of the old order and the establishment of the new.

He replied: 'Nation shall rise against nation and kingdom against kingdom; and there shall be famines, and pestilences, and earthquakes, in divers places.' He further mentioned the unrest that would prevail, together with distress and perplexity of nations regarding their individual and collective problems. We see all these things beginning to have, and having fulfillment. As another clear indication of the beginning of the new order Jesus mentioned the fact that Jerusalem would be no longer trodden down of the Gentiles; evidently referring to the restoration of Palestine to the Jews which we now see taking place.

"One more item should be carefully noted."

Jesus said, 'This generation shall not pass, until all these things be fulfilled.' In other words, the entire work of establishing the new order, together with the troubles incident thereto, will be accomplished within the lifetime of one generation. Therefore the blessings which the new order will bring are at hand; and soon all the sorrows of the earth will be only a memory." —Adv.
