SAYS HOT WEATHER IS NOT TO BLAME

Chicago Doctor Declares Deaths Due to Other Causes

STOCKTON, Cal., Aug. 26.—(UP)—Due to friendly rivalry between two inland empire cities, Sacramento and Stockton, Stocktonians recently registered consternation when weather reports had it eight degrees hotter in Stockton than in Sacramento. Stockton's only deduction was that Shasta's glacier had broken, sending ice flows down the Sacramento river to caress the capitol city. Investigation proved Sacramento to have a weather bureau and Stockton hasn't, and that Stockton's daily report was published 24 hours late. San Joaquin valley is peaceful again. The matter is adjusted and once more the two cities are running neck and neck for temperature honors.

LONG WINDED ORATORS OVERCOME 200 CHILDREN

SAPPORO, Japan, (UP)—Great excitement has been aroused here by alleged cruelty on the part of orators who, insisting that 9,000 pupils stand in a blazing sun for several hours while they spoke at inauguration ceremonies of the Sapporo Branch of the Japan Red Cross Society, caused the collapse of more than 200 of the children who subsequently required medical aid. Children of twelve primary schools were forced to line up and stand at attention throughout the speeches, and although they soon began to faint one by one, no abridgement of the program was allowed, it was charged.

CHICAGO, Aug. 25.—(UP)—Ministers of the middle west no longer have any excuse for not being as good business men as they are purveyors of the gospel. A six-weeks course on "Business Management for Preachers" is now in session at the Chicago Theological Seminary. The Minister's Correspondence, "His Files and Records," "How to Avoid Unnecessary Interruptions," "Upkeep and Improvement of Church Property," "How to Run Clubs and Brotherhoods," and "The Relation of the Minister to the Women's Groups" are included in the list of topics discussed. The ministers are also learning how to remember dates, faces and names as well as all about the latest thing in clothing for pulpit and general wear. "The preacher must not be a sort of glorified errand boy or forsake the major task of preaching and saving souls for that of organization and administration," President Osora Davis of the Seminary explained in telling the purpose of the new course.
