JAPANESE CONTROVERSY OVER HEIGHT FUJIYAMA

TOKYO. (UP)—Surveyors of the Home Affairs Department of the General Staff have gone to war over the height of Fujiyama, Japan's famous sacred mountain. Newest figures obtained by the General Staff give the altitude of the great volcanic cone as 12,395 feet. The Home Ministry figures give 12,294 feet. Japanese pilgrims up the mountain have for years considered the height 12,365 feet, remembering the last three figures by the number of days in the year.

NEW FALL STYLES IN BONNETS GIVEN

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—(UP)—Paris high-hats us with high crowned turbans of felt, velour and velvet which look extremely Russian in influence. These new high-crowned shapes are very chic, on both young and older women, although they are inclined to give a more sophisticated air than the flapper desires.

For the flapper the Apache tam which combines the high effect with youthful lines is sponsored. One smart New York store is selling these felt tams in such colors as Chanel red, tan, bright rose red, green and black. A deep head-fitting band of felt extends deep over the forehead and this gradually molds upwards into a tam crown. The felt is peec-edged at the base where it meets the forehead and does not turn under to meet the hat lining since the Apache model must lie flat to the forehead, without displaying any bulk. Crowns of the various millinery modes are soft and may be draped or dented to suit the face of the individual.

A craze for gold and silver metallic effects will be found in the Fall gown collections. Velvet combined with gold or silver lace forms many of the newer gowns of formal type. One gown which is typical of the mode, has a soft crinkly bodice which molds the figure in semi-fitted lines until it reaches below the hips where three circular ruffles of chiffon velvet forms the tiered skirt.

The ruffles are het onto the bodice in irregular fashion thus avoiding the straight-about hip-line. Metal brocade turbans will undoubtedly be popular again for formal occasions due to the metallic influence in frocks.
