COMMANDER JOHN RODGERS

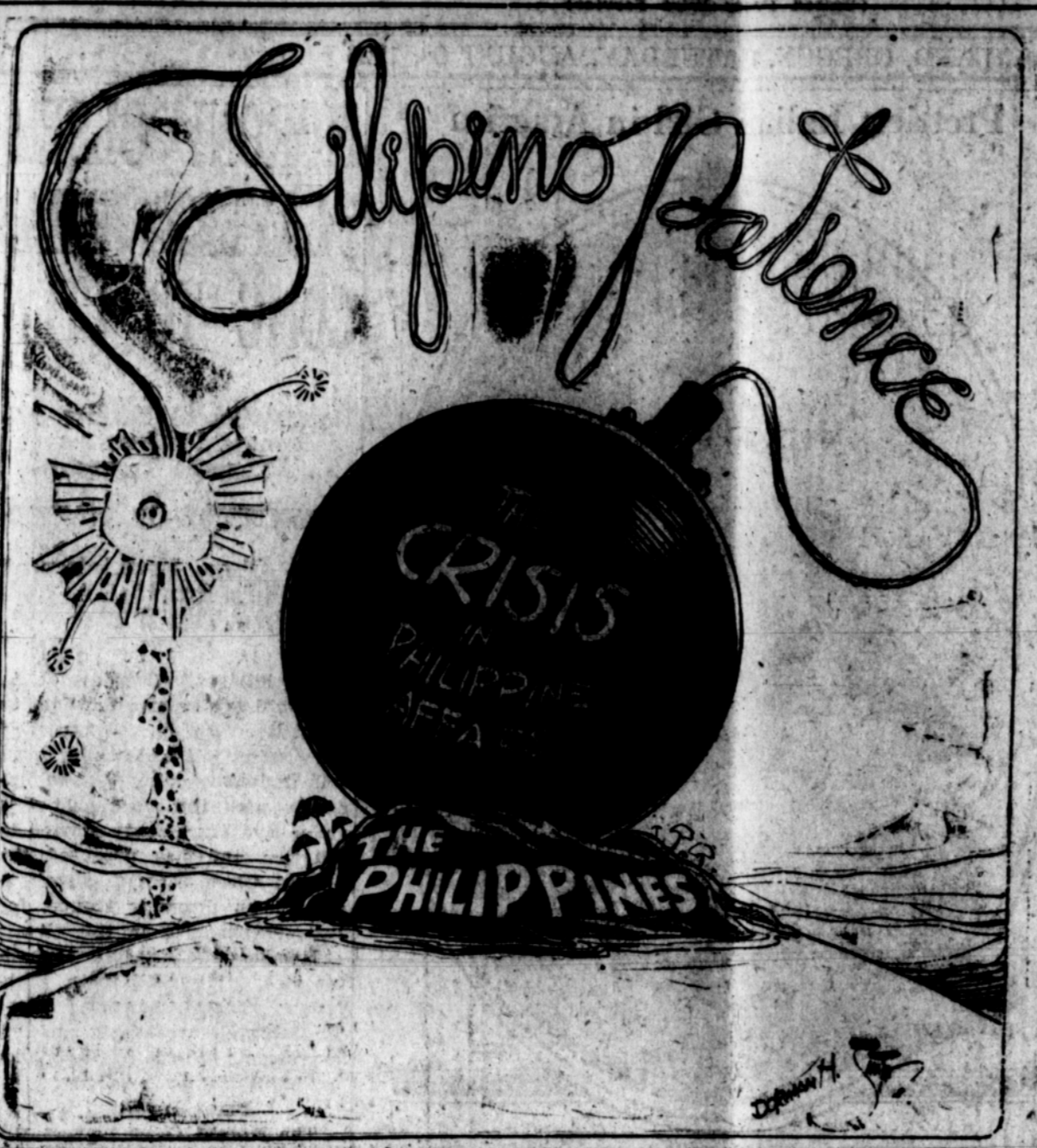

WAR IN PACIFIC IS DECLARED POSSIBLE

SYDNEY (United Press) — A warning to Australia that a war was more than possible in the Pacific was uttered by Lieutenant-General Sir John Monash, who led the Australian troops in the world war, in a public speech here.

Castigating the apathetic public spirit in regard to defense, Monash said: "Everyone who thinks knows that the future civilization is bound up with the problem of the Pacific. Yet we do not talk about it because people come and cry. 'What a provocative utterance! You are trying to stir up trouble with the nations in the East!'"

"It is the duty of those responsible for the defense of the nation to postulate where a possible attack may come from and to prepare against it. Whatever we may say of the present situation in the East, the Washington Conference and the League of Nations, we must not forget that there has seldom been a war which has not come suddenly and unexpectedly.

"If there is ever to be a war in the Pacific, it will come just as suddenly and unexpectedly, in spite of the ameliorative efforts which civilization has been making to mitigate war."

Monash warned Australians that the only way they could prepare to provide the necessary modern defense equipment—aircraft, guns and the like.

Reno Is Seeking Federal Arsenal

RENO, Nev., (UP)—Following recommendation by the naval board of inquiry, which probed the disastrous arsenal explosion at Lake Denmark, N. J., that two new arsenals be constructed, one in the Pacific coast territory, Reno is making a strong bid for the western location.

Senator Tasker Oddie has taken the proposition before Secretary of the Navy Wilbur and all civic organizations are backing the project.

Reno's claim to a favorable location is based on suitable grounds, accessible but removed from the city, and the proximity of this region to Pacific coast cities.

Young Cow Mother Sets New Record

DINUBA, Cal., Aug. 25.—Bessie, a "bosie", boasting an age of only two summers plus eight months is believed to be the youngest cow mother on the Pacific coast.

Bessie is the mother of three calves, the first arriving 13 months ago when Bessie was little more than a calf herself. Twins arrived a few days ago and both are expected to live.

LASSEN VOLCANO IS BEING INVESTIGATED

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Aug. 26 (U. P.)—Delicate instruments, capable of taking the temperature of the heartbeats and feeling the pulse of America's only active volcano, Mt. Lassen, are being used in Lassen National Park as a result of an act of congress.

Like the famous Hawaiian volcano, Mt. Lassen is to be equipped with an underground laboratory, containing sensitive instruments to record each new tremor or outbreak, while overhead the volcano will be harnessed with precision levelings, temporary seismograph stations, gravity stations, chemistry laboratories and other equipment necessary to record the daily changes of the great volcano.

This announcement was made by Dr. T. A. Jaggar, chief of the section of volcanology, United States Geological Survey, who recently made a thorough inspection trip through Lassen National Park, where he conferred with A. L. Conard, president of the park association.

California has other volcanic phenomena. Dr. Jaggar declares. In Northern Sonoma county is situated an entire valley filled with "fumaroles" or steam geysers, some of which are being harnessed to generate electric power. All these are due to receive government investigation when proper state cooperation and funds are made available.

Teacher In Favor of Mexican Laws

PROVO, Utah, (UP)—Although many Americans deplore the stand taken by the Mexican government in its anti-religious decrees, Ralph Keeler for many years principal of schools of Colonia, Juarez, Mexico, believes the new laws will be of untold benefit to the Mexican people.

"Since Cortez conquered Mexico the religious affairs there have been entwined with the civic," with him large groups of Spanish priests, who were given tremendous power.

"For centuries the Spaniards have ruled. High positions have been held by the Spanish residents of Mexico, while the natives were subjected and placed virtually under bondage.

"A long step toward liberation was taken with adoption of the Carranza constitution in 1917 which provided that no foreign born child could operate in the churches or schools of Mexico."

Keeler said the Spanish people devote too little thought to the development of the natural resources of the country. He believes that if the present religious laws in Mexico are maintained an unprecedented era of progress and prosperity will result with peace and progress gradually replacing the revolutionary spirit that has prevailed during the past century.
