**IRRIGATION IS BIG AUSTRALIA PROBLEM**

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Aug. 28.—Though separated by thousands of miles, California and Australia have much in common, due to the great gold rushes that gave each its big start toward wealth and power.

Sir Joseph Carruthers, Sydney, widely known political figure in the antipodes and a member of the New South Wales assembly, brought this fact out on his arrival on his first visit to the United States.

"Historically, California's and Australia's struggles were the same. Fortunately for Australia, California's great gold rush of '49 preceded ours. After our gold fever subsided we in Australia turned to California's history and imitated her by going into agricultural pursuits.

"Irrigation, a big problem in Australia, also was patterned after that of California. We first made the mistake of planting only stoned fruits. But again we looked to California and found proper substitutes in citrus fruits and grapes.
