BERKELEY—Dr. W. W. Campbell, president of the University of California and one of the world's leading scientists, has been elected to the Royal Academy of the Lincei, in Rome, as a foreign member of the astronomy, geodesy and geophysics section of world research.

The savant before assuming duties at the California institution was for 22 years a director of Lick Observatory. Before that he won high distinction in scientific circles by his eclipse expeditions in India, Spain, Russia, Japan and Egypt.
