(Continued From Page One) They were not in unfavorable places at both buildings, making it almost certain that no real damage could be done. It is their belief it was the work either of some crazed man or else a deliberate plot to draw police and firemen to one part of the city so the perpetrators might be unmolested to commit some crime in another part of the city. Chief of Police McNabb was more inclined to the theory that it was the work of some fanatic. Officials were continuing their investigations this afternoon and it is expected that an arson specialist from the state fire marshals office will also come to Ashland to assist in the probe.
