NEWTON'S THEORY IS CLAIMED WRONG

SAN FRANCISCO — (UP) — Astronomical revelations disclosing what is claimed to be a new law of nature finding Newton's equilibrium theory in error, have been made by Captain See, U. S. Sec. government astronomer at Mare Island.

Captain See's calculations, which have definitely been accepted by leading scientists, prove that tides originating in the Pacific Ocean cause the globe to wobble on its axis and his theory fixes the rigidity of the earth as three times that of standard steel.

The discoveries followed a series of minute and highly exact calculations of tidal heights and were a consequence of the efforts of Captain See to determine the cause of a variation of the earth's latitude, caused by the rotation of the North and South Poles once every 14 months about the true axis or mean position.

The government astronomer not only succeeded in proving that this variation a puzzle to scientists since its discovery is caused by tides originating in the Pacific Ocean and traveling westward, through the Indian and Atlantic oceans to the shores of France, but he found that Newton's theory by which the average height of tides is calculated, is in error and that under a heretofore unknown law of nature, the average height is twice that calculated by the discoverer of the law of gravitation.

Captain See's findings settle definitely two points upon which scientists have speculated for more than 100 years, it is claimed. They establish that on large bodies of land exist between Alaska and the North Pole, and they prove that the center of the earth is not liquid.

STANFORD TO HAVE GOOD STRONG TEAM

FALO ALTO, Calif., Aug. 21 (UP)—Faced with one of the hardest schedules in many seasons and spurred on by the early season forecasts who characterize them as one of the 170 strongest teams in the Pacific Coast conference this year, the Cardinals with the arrival of Coach "Pop" Warner from the east are preparing for a stretch of unusually intensive training leading up to the schedule opening.

"Pop" Warner has for the most part a veteran team. At the same time he has so far an array of new material that no veteran could be said to be safe in his berth. The signs of half a dozen prep schools last year are ready to try out with Stanford.

A double header engagement on September 25 with two non-conference teams is expected to reveal the strength of the 1927 Cards. Warner expects to give every player a tryout in these games.

The retrain coach has three positions to fill. They are fullback, quarter and guard. Filling the place of Ernie Nevers, one of the most sensational fullbacks the game has ever produced, will not be so difficult as was at first believed, in the opinion of the coaching staff. "Hank Millage, out most of last season with injuries, an expert passer and punting player, is Warner's candidate for Nevers' shoes.
