## Famous Buckers to Perform When Pendleton's Curtain Falls



Hugh Stickland sometimes called "the grand old man" of the Round-up, who has personally ridden most of the world's worst bucking horses, and is still at it. He will be among the foremost contenders when the Round-up starts on Sept. 15. When he will ride anything they bring out.

Who's going to be who in the bucking contests at the Round-up? I've kinda lost out. But I've ridden this year is becoming an all-shocking topic throughout the entire west as Sept. 15, the date of the opening of the great cowboy classic at Pendleton approaches. Names of riders of the past, names of horses that have bucked and lost, or bucked and won, roll trippingly off the tongues of the spectators who gather to watch Round-up stock unloaded from cars, or who gaze at the night lights, and barn forever in the faces of certain bad horses. Sooner or later, in every such group, talk usually centers to the best horse that ever bucked — Hugh Stickland, the grand old man of the Round-up. For Hugh has been riding since he was a boy, and his name is more familiar to the cowboy than any other in the west. And present indications are that Hugh will still be riding when a long time after some of his younger competitors are through.

"Stick" is the best of the best of them all. He's forgotten who will be riding on the long his weight to a fifth.

"I used to have an adding machine to keep track of 'em on," says Hugh. "But somebody stole my wife's trunk once, and the ser lights, all out to win the glories that are Hugh's because the 'old man,' as they call him, is far from old, and can still ride anything they bring out of the chute or turn loose in the chute for Hugh to bring out."

Just what the bucking situation at Pendleton this year is to be, though, is a man's intriguing subject than riders. It is well-known that a number of Pendleton officials visited Cheyenne this year, and equally well known that there were some vicious horses there. Last year, following similar visit, the deceptive and diminutive Tom Thumb, and the unreliable Bootlegger horses were both purchased there. Will there be some new additions to Pendleton's string as a result of this year's visit?

There was a big sorrel, Frinistance — but why give it away, if it happened? Let some of the boys get a surprise at the tryouts which are due to start any day now. Maybe the sorrel pony will be there. And maybe not. Who knows? If the Round-up officials do, they are maintaining a discreet silence.

From down Winnemucca way, they are telling a story about a buck named Coyote. This horse has been at various roundups in the country, an exhibition horse. He's far too vicious to be ridden in any of the big contest arenas. It was once customary to pay ambitious bronk riders ten dollars a second to fork this one.
