HOLLYWOOD SHEIKS START NEW STYLES

HOLLYWOOD, Sept. 7.—(UP)—The male fashion-plates at the movies are out-doing the girls' stars in trick-style fads for all. And that, according to the commentators, is the "no plus ultra" of fashion, because Hollywood wearers are noted everywhere for their audacity in dress.

The neck-tie belt, knitted bowtie, two-piece underwear, black shirt, and red satin vest are a few of the latest style fables of the film heroes.

Harry Langdon for example, has brought out a distinctly Langdonian paradox—a hand-knitted black bow-tie. The comedian, off screen, is noted as one of the few sane dressers in the film city, where hair-grease was first popularized.

But hundreds are copying the fad, and the little old lady on a Hollywood side-street who knits Harry's neck-ties is now being stormed with Langdon admires in search of hand-knitted black bow-ties.

Walter Pidgeon, leading man for Norma Talmadge, is wearing his trousers without belts or suspenders. Instead, he uses silk neckties, new or old, wound around his waspish waist, run through the pant-loops.

Black shirts, with an Italian flavor are widely worn by the actors and their imitators. Joseph von Sternberg is said to have started this fad. His shirts, with collar attached, are of shiny black satin. Many extras, with an eye to economy have adopted the fashion — it saves laundry bills.

Striped silk and linen underwear in two pieces, the trunks tied in the back with tasseled cords, have been adopted by many of the screen idols, including Jack Gilbert, Conrad Nagle, Norman Kerry and others.

Another trick creation is the "rabbit-eared shirt," by Richard Barthelmess. It is an ordinary soft white affair, with the longest pointed collars ever seen in these much photographed parts. Those who have glimpsed the collars at close range declare the points are more than six-inches long.

Jack Muhlall is popularizing silk golf socks—a comfortable idea for sunny California, at least. Ken Maynard, the new cowboy star, gave boulevard admirers a thrill the other day by appearing in a red satin vest, covered with tasseled designs.

Other fables rumored by advance agents, but not yet catniping, are bathing caps covered with colored cartoons, snake-skin riding boots, and three-colored shoe-strings.

CHURCHES JOIN IN PRAYERS FOR RAIN

HARBIN, Manchuria.—(UP)—A practical union of churches is reported from Kuangchensze, a station on the Chinese Eastern Railway near Changchun, where an exceptional drought impelled the Chinese population to urge the local Russian Orthodox Church to join them in a community prayer for rain.

For a month the neighboring region had not felt a single drop of rain and farmers were anxiously searching the sky for the sight of a cloud which would bring relief to the parched fields. In despair the population tried to mollify the "God of Rains" by prayers and offerings—but the answer Rain God remained deaf.

Finally the local Merchants Guild organized a mass prayer meeting of farmers and merchants in front of the Buddhist temple. At every shop entrance and prayer-candles were burning—all butchers shops were closed and a general fast was ordered until the first rainfall.

The religious ceremony was conducted by several Buddhist priests and when this was ended, all those present were laid by the priests and representatives of the Merchants Guild towards the Russian Orthodox Church.

According to the demand of the Chinese population, the Russian priest held an impressive church service, according to Orthodox rites, imploring God to grant rain.

The church was surrounded by a huge crowd of Chinese, bare-headed and kneeling down at the sign of the priest. Many Russians joined themselves to these prayers. The religious ecstasy was tremendous and the Chinese, although not understanding the Orthodox rites, fervently prayed the Christian God in their own fashion.

Later the whole procession, headed by the Russian and Buddhist priests proceeded to the settlement near Changchun.

Several young Communists who were met on the way and did not take off their hats were obliged to do so by the Chinese police. The ceremony which started at 10 a. m. lasted until 4 p. m.

Three days later the first rain of the season started the periodical rainy season of Manchuria two weeks ahead of its usual date.



TRADES UNION WILL SEEK IMPROVEMENT

BOURNEMOUTH, Eng., Sept. 6.—(UP)—Unity in a common organization of trade unions of all countries, a minimum wage scale and a maximum working week of 44 hours were the principal demands of resolutions presented at the annual meeting of the Trades Union Congress.

More than 1,000 delegates, representing all of the national British unions affiliated with the Trades Union Congress, attended.

One of the principal resolutions presented to the Congress for adoption was made by the Iron and Steel Trades Federation which proposed an international wage convention to consider a minimum wage scale as a necessary corollary to the 44-hour convention.

They declare that the British Government should prohibit the importation of competing goods into Great Britain produced in foreign countries under conditions harmful to the worker. The resolution is particularly directed against some of the so-called "cheap labor" in Oriental countries and countries where the "sweatshop" prevails.

Another resolution called upon the Trades Union Council to agitate for the ratification of the Washington Convention on Hours of Industrial Employment.

Several resolutions dealing with the payment of wages on regular yearly national holidays were presented.

The Amalgamated Society of Tailors and Tailoresses voted a protest against the "growing tendency in the garment trade to have workers take their labor into the home." They demanded that the council place the situation before the Home Secretary with a demand that legislation be passed forbidding garment workers from working "under such conditions."

The Engineering Union proposed "definite powers for the General Council as follows: "To assist unions or alliance of unions contemplating entering upon a struggle for the improvement of, or in defense of, the conditions of their members, by taking over direction of the struggle.

"To have power to levy all or part of the affiliated unions.

"To call a stoppage of work by affiliated organizations."


The building workers union, however, apparently deploring the results of the recent general strike, presented a resolution making a complete ban and full confession of the points at issue necessary before a general walk-out could be called.

To Start Flying to Land of Beer

SAN FRANCISCO, (U. P.)—Pacific Coast cognac-teachers football followers are expected to remain very much in the dark at least until midseason on the relative progress of a majority of the coaches. Five of the nine conference teams are under new instructors.

It is conceded that any one of the nine mentors has a chance to give a niche in football's hall of fame this season, for the way is unobstructed. Onlookers will direct attentive eyes as the season advances.

California, Washington State, Idaho, Montana and Oregon are the teams now under new coaches. Of these, "Nibe" Price of California, will perhaps be most closely watched.

Among the four teams under old hands, Enoch Bagshaw of Washington is the oldest in point of service. He will be called upon to protect the conference championship won by his Huskies last year against the invasion of these five "strangers" in coast grid circles.
