THE COMING PRIZEFIGHT

The Philadelphia Stadium, where the Dempsey-Tunney fight is to be held on September 23, seats 100,000 people ordinarily, but for this event it is planned to install additional seats which will bring the total seating capacity to 150,000.

For his participation in the fight Dempsey is to receive \$450,000. Tunney's stipend will be \$150,000. If the fight goes the scheduled distance of ten rounds it will last, including intermissions, thirty-nine minutes.

Advance demand for seats for the Dempsey-Tunney fight is said to exceed anything of the sort that has been in evidence heretofore. It is certain that a vast gathering will be on hand. If prize fighting is a brutalizing sport then apparently there are more of the brutishly inclined among us than heretofore.
