Typewriter with Many Keys Has Forty Alphabets

Taking rapid dictation directly on the typewriter, without the use of shorthand, is said to be possible with



an instrument on which the inventor, a former court reporter, asserts he has attained a speed of 280 words a minute. It differs considerably from the usual typewriter, the board, for instance, having 1,100 keys which cover not less than forty alphabets. The machine is the result of twenty-five years of study.

Mystery of Ocean Currents Solved by Bottles

The second mate fixes the steamer's position, writes down the bearings on a slip of paper and stuffs it into a bottle which is corked and thrown overboard. Nearly a year later, the bottle, covered with barnacles, is washed ashore 1,450 miles away, is found and returned to the navy department, increasing the navy's knowledge of the mysterious ways of the ocean. What is said to be the most remarkable trip of a bottle was started from the British steamship "Australia" about 750 miles south and east of Africa. After three years, it was recovered off the coast of Chile, having traveled 8,000 miles.

Old Fallacies about Food Refuted by Doctors

Like balloons, superstitions are handed down from generation to generation and some of them which have gathered about food and eating habits have been detrimental to health, physicians assert. As an example, they cite the widespread belief that tomatoes thin the blood. This mistaken idea probably is the result of a queer mental twist. Tomatoes are red like blood and heavy, but thinner than blood, therefore they must thin the blood. But doctors declare that the fact is that the vegetables are exceedingly healthful and their juice is widely fed to babies, as a substitute for that of the orange, to promote growth. The belief that milk and acid fruits eaten together produce ill effects is also widely held. If they do curdle, doctors see no cause for alarm, because milk goes through this reaction with the gastric juice as soon as it reaches the stomach. Many women spend hours soaking cucumbers "to draw off the poison" without stopping to think that if the peel really were poisonous, the injurious substances would soak all the way through the cucumber. Special foods are in wide demand in some parts because they are said to be rich in helpful iron content. Ordinary lean meat, spinach, carrots, lettuce and egg yolk are considered sufficiently filled with iron to supply the normal body needs. That fish is a brain food is another common cookery delusion.

Deathrate over Forty Is Increasing

The gain in life expectancy is due largely to the saving of lives under thirty-five, according to Dr. J. Howard Beard, of the university of Illinois, because the deathrate over forty

is increasing. There are four more deaths per thousand persons between forty-five and fifty than twenty years ago, six more between fifty and fifty-five, and eight more at fifty-five to sixty. Better control of communicable diseases and decrease of infant mortality have lessened the danger to younger persons, but the gain may be offset by the increasing number of fatal accidents.

Lens Mounted on Sewing Table

Eye strain can be eliminated to some extent by attaching a reading glass to the sewing table. A spring and washer on a pivot screw serve to hold the handle of the glass against a beveled block and a small collar on the pivot screw enters a recess in the handle, as shown. The glass is removed by pressing it down from the catch and pulling it away from the pivot. When not in use, the glass is swung under the table top where it is safe. The beveled block should have such a slant that the lens will be held at an angle convenient for threading



needles. Cloth, held on the knees, can be cut along a thread without strain, and certain knots in embroidery may be tied much more quickly.

HEAVYWEIGHTS ARE COMING TO FRONT

NEW YORK, Sept. 8 — Not since the war have two such promising young heavyweights attracted the public attention that is being given to Monte Munn, Nebraska legislator, and Harry Persson, a big Swede and the best heavyweight in Europe.

This statement is made, without losing thought of Luis Angel Firpo and with the realization that it is fickle to pick out rookie fighters and expect too much of them on early form.

But Munn and Persson are worth a guess not only because of the native ability they seem to have and the physical attributes that they surely have, but because of the trainers in whom they have placed their future.

Munn has placed himself in the hands of wise old Dan Hickey, who developed Paul Berlenbach and Persson has lined up with Jimmy DeFrost who prepared Jack Dempsey for his fight against Willard and who perhaps is the greatest trainer of boxers in the world.

De Forest, who has been looking around for a heavyweight championship prospect for seven years and who has scouted hundreds after Jack Kearns dismissed him after the Toledo fight thought he had found his fortune when Firpo crawled out of a cellar in Newark and came to him for advice.

But Firpo wouldn't stick. He thought that De Forest wasn't setting him along fast enough and he listened to amateur experts who told him that De Forest was still a Dempsey man and that he would teach him the wrong things so that Dempsey could whip him.

"I never could have made a finished fighter out of Firpo," said De Forest later. "He never could have been taught how to box because he wasn't built to be a boxer. But I could have put him in physical condition and taught him to defend himself. I also had the disadvantage of being forced to give him all his instructions through an interpreter."

If De Forest had been in his corner when he fought Dempsey, Firpo might have won the world's championship. The referee would have been in a tough spot, at least, if one of Firpo's seconds had made a real protest about fouls and De Forest certainly would not have lost his head as Firpo's men did.

Because of the "Beckets," the Scots and the other prominent European heavyweights, Americans have an inclination to titter when a fighter comes to this country bearing foreign decorations, but Persson is a real pro-

SHERIFF CANDIDATE OPPOSED BY LEGION

Vancouver Candidate in Bad Because of Alleged Desertion

VANCOUVER, Wash., Sept. 11.—Holding that Roy E. McCrite, present Vancouver chief of police and candidate for the Republican nomination for sheriff of Clark county, is not a citizen of the United States, a resolution passed by the local American Legion post and filed with the county auditor asks that his name be stricken from the ballot. The resolution declares that McCrite deserted from the army in 1905 and thereby lost his citizenship rights.

ALLEGHENY ARSENAL TO BE SOLD TODAY

PITTSBURGH — (UP) — Allegheny Arsenal, center of Pittsburgh's war activities since 1814, today was placed on the auction block.

The historic landmark, viewed by all important personages who have visited Pittsburgh since the days of Lafayette, will go to the highest bidder, its usefulness having disappeared.

The Old File of Battery was never the scene of battle action, but was the site of one of the disasters of the civil war. Seventy-four children, 70 of them girls, were killed there when engaged in making cartridges for use by the union army. Several buildings in the Arsenal were demolished by the terrific explosion, but soon rebuilt.

When the United States entered the World War in 1917 and Pittsburgh became one of the centers of munition manufacturing, the Arsenal was utilized as a warehouse. The war ended, the Arsenal was leased for commercial purposes, and it will now be sold outright. The Old Arsenal was built at a cost of \$200,000. It was surmounted by a watch tower, 120 feet high.

ELECTRIFICATION OF HOLY LAND PLANNED

PARIS — (UP) — French and British engineers have completed a project which it is hoped will be put into execution very soon for the electrification of Palestine by causing the waters of the eastern Mediterranean to flow over a 280-foot ridge bordering the coast, thence through a canal east out of solid rock, when the waters would hurl themselves down in an almost sheer drop into Lake Tiberius and the Dead Sea, more than one thousand feet under the level of the Mediterranean.

It is estimated that the electric energy capable of being thus developed would be sufficient for Palestine, Syria, Asiatic Turkey and Egypt. The total cost is placed at about \$75,000,000. Able scientists have calculated the net energy at 426,000 H. P.

"Palestine is the classic land of miracles," said Edouard Imbeaux, the French expert, chief author of the plan, to the correspondent of the United Press. "I firmly believe modern science will accomplish miracles there in its turn."

M. Lombaux has sent to the Academy of Sciences a long, detailed statement of the geographic and other conditions favoring the plan for the electrification of Palestine. He emphasized that between the Mediterranean and the enormous depression in which are situated the valley of the Jordan, Lake Tiberius and the Dead Sea, there is only a low ridge less than two miles wide. He proposes therefore:

1. Construction of a maritime canal from Haifa with twelve locks gradually rising to the summit of the ridge near the Zerin peak the Jisrael of the Bible.

2. Piercing of the peak, a distance of about 3,000 yards, and construction of an artificial river on the other slope of the

BROADCASTING A FACE

WEDNESDAY, Sept. 10, 1914
LONDON (United Press). — "I knew it was you by the sound of your face" may soon become a common salutation. Already radio listeners all over England know the sound of Captain Hutchinson's face. It is a low, growling sound, like a far away airplane.

Captain Hutchinson has been broadcasting his face on a 300 meter wave length for several weeks, experimenting in the new science of "television," sending motion pictures by radio broadcast.

His face registers in ordinary receiving sets only as a continuous hum, but when the "television apparatus" is hooked in, his face is shown on a screen so that the hearer of his words can tell, while he listens, whether the Captain is smiling or serious.

The British Government has just issued the first of two "television" licenses on record, one for the London office of the company,

3. Construction of a plant which would receive the falling torrent about twelve hundred feet below just above Lake Tiberius. Another plant would be constructed further south, permitting a further drop of nearly four hundred feet into the Dead Sea.
