ASHLAND WILL CLOSE UP FOR COUNTY FAIR

Friday Will Be Big Day of Week for Residents of This City

BIG TIME PROMISED

Local Band to Furnish Music; Exhibits Gets Under Way Today

So far as Ashland folks are concerned, Friday will be a big day at the Jackson county fair. Stores, offices and business houses generally will close at noon Friday in order that residents of this city might attend the biggest and best exhibit in the history of Jackson county.

The Ashland municipal band, under the leadership of Carl Loveland, will furnish music for the fair during the afternoon, and in every respect it will be recognized as Ashland day.

Fair Starts Today

The fair got under way this morning, with crowds from every section arriving by stage and auto for the opening day. As soon as the big gates swung open, crowds began pouring into the fair grounds to begin their inspection of the varied exhibits in the numerous buildings.

Although the bright sunshine weather bureau officials gave assurance that the present clouds would soon blow over and good weather is predicted for the balance of the week.

Everything Ready
One thing so noticeable this morning was the fact that practically all exhibits in every department were in place and ready for the inspection of visitors.

Heretofore, here and elsewhere, opening day has been more or less confusing because of the sound of saws and hammers as carpenters were busily engaged in putting on the finishing touches.

The opening program of races is on this afternoon, with two harness events and two running events. The races will be continued each afternoon throughout the week.

AIMEE ADMITS SHE HAS PAID WOMAN MONEY

Evangelist Confesses Giving Funds to Mrs. Lorraine Wiseman

CREATES SENSATION

Says It Was Only "Expense Money"; Ormiston Ready to Talk Now

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 15.—(UP)—Official action in the Aimee Semple McPherson case is expected at any moment this afternoon following a conference by District Attorney Asa Keyes with his deputies. The prosecutor declared it is time for action, because, in his opinion, recent evidence has disclosed that the state as well as the public has been imposed upon.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 15.—(UP)—Breaking a silence maintained since the sensational confession of Mrs. Lorraine Wiseman that she was paid to perpetrate the "Miss X" hoax, Aimee Semple McPherson has admitted that she paid the woman "expense" money.

Although the evangelist's attorney denied in a statement that Mrs. Wiseman had ever received any money from Mrs. McPherson, the Bible teacher refuted this late yesterday. She said that Mrs. Wiseman had received small amounts from her just as she had paid money to other investigators working on the case.

"It seemed only right that when persons came to us and offered their assistance, we should advance a little expense money," the evangelist said. "There was nothing unusual in the fact that Mrs. Wiseman received money from me, as the circumstances

Continued Prosperity Seen in Re-Election of Present Executive

PAUL SMITH'S N. Y., Sept. 15.—The climax of the summer campaign to link Coolidge and prosperity came Tuesday, when the last visitor of the season threw out the suggestion that Mr. Coolidge's re-election would assure five years more of prosperity.

Herbert J. Tilly of Philadelphia, chairman of the Retailers' National council, representing 175,000 stores, brought to the presidential sent to members a few days ago.

BITTER RIVAL SLAIN BY MONTANA MAN

Shoots Man Who Worsted Him in Business Deal on Town Street

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Sept. 15.—A 15-year-old feud, over a business deal, was ended yesterday when Sheriff Fleming of Blaine county, shot and killed Dan Savage, aged pioneer, on the streets of Harlem, after Savage and Charles A. Smith had engaged in a revolver duel, in the street, emptying their weapons. Although only 20 feet apart, both missed.

Savage ran when the officer ordered him to stop. The latter fired and Savage fell, mortally wounded.

CUTTER MAKES LAST FAR NORTH VOYAGE

Veteran Vessel Bear is Back From Arctic; is Given Big Ovation

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15.—The revenue cutter Bear, veteran of a half-century of service in Arctic ice packs, has returned from her final "cruse of mercy."

Sensing the drama in the Bear's return from her last voyage to the northern outposts of harbor vessels set up a shrill welcome of whistles and sirens as the staunch old craft came through the Golden Gate at sunset.

Launched as a whaling ship in Scotland 52 years ago, the Bear has made 41 trips into the Arctic as a United States revenue cutter, taking mail, medical supplies and jurisprudence to ice-bound settlements of Alaska. She has participated in a score of heroic rescues in addition to her routine duties.

SENATOR JONES AHEAD

Washington Incumbent Nominated; Other Primary Elections Held

BALTIMORE, Md., Sept. 15.—(UP)—Representative John Phillips Hill, militant wet leader, had a substantial lead in the republican senatorial primary over O. E. Weller, incumbent, as returns were being tabulated today. Representative Millard G. Tydings was unopposed in the democratic senatorial primary.

Governor Albert C. Ritchie, democrat, was renominated, winning over William M. Malley. In the republican gubernatorial race Marlon A. Humphries and A. E. Mullikin are running a close race.

JONES AHEAD

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 15.—(UP)—Senator Wesley L. Jones was leading his nearest opponent, Austin Griffith, by a wide margin in the republican senatorial contest today.

GROESBECK DEFEATED

DEROIT, Mich., Sept. 15.—(UP)—Governor Alex H. Groesbeck has been defeated for the republican gubernatorial nomination by an indicated majority of 75,000 votes, with Mayor Fred Green of Iona the winning candidate.

JUDGE WEEKS AHEAD

BURLINGTON, Vt., Sept. 15.—(UP)—Judge John E. Weeks has been nominated for governor by the republicans in President Coolidge's home state, having a substantial lead over Max L. Powell and Lieutenant Governor Walker Farnsworth.

RICE MEANS BEATEN

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 15.—(UP)—With a third of the returns in, Charles Waterman, republican, had a two to one lead over Senator Rice W. Means for the United States senatorial nomination.

40 REVOLUTIONISTS KILLED IN FIGHTING

Nicaragua Rebels Suffer Heavy Losses in Bluefields Skirmish

NICARAGUA, Managua, Sept. 15.—Government reports from Bluefields, on the Atlantic coast declare that 40 revolutionaries have been killed and 60 wounded in the bombardment of the last four days. The government casualties are placed at tow wounded.

LOCAL POLICE ARE ASKED TO AID IN SEARCH FOR YOUTH

James Zinn Drops From Sight in Ashland While Enroute North

Mystery surrounds the disappearance here on Sept. 3 of James Walton Zinn, aged 17, who became separated from his parents at Redding, Cal., while enroute from Marysville to Hood River.

Chief of Police McNabb today received a request from Sheriff Edick of Hood River county asking him to aid in an investigation of the boy's disappearance.

The young man was driving an Overland touring car with a temporary California license and registered at the local chamber of commerce here on Sept. 3, shortly after his parents registered here. His parents were driving north in another car.

But after the young man arrived here nothing more has been heard from him and his parents are greatly alarmed over his continued absence.

The parents cannot account for his continued absence unless he has met with an accident since leaving Ashland or has run out of funds and is being delayed somewhere enroute.

The description of the boy is given as being 5 feet, 8 inches tall and weighing about 185 pounds. He has blue eyes and brown hair. When last seen here he was wearing blue overalls, a lavender plaid sweater, cap and black shoes.

INDEPENDENCE, Ore., Sept. 15.—Edward Rex, a prominent rancher living north of Independence, had his arm ground off while operating an ensilage machine on his ranch at 10 o'clock this morning.

Rex was feeding the machine, when, in some unaccountable way, his hand was caught and before the machine could be stopped the arm was drawn in to the elbow. He was taken to a Salem hospital.

LOS ANGELES MAIL MAKES SPEEDY TRIP

Letter Mailed in South This Morning Gets Here Before Noon

AIR SERVICE STARTS

Planes From Both North and South Arrive at Fair Grounds Field

Letters which left the post office at Los Angeles this morning arrived in the Ashland post office shortly after 11 o'clock this morning, thus establishing a new record in the speedy dispatch of Pacific coast mail.

Start of the Pacific coast air mail service from Los Angeles and Seattle this morning made possible the receipt of mail here a few hours after it had been mailed in Los Angeles. Planes from both Los Angeles and Seattle arrived at the fair grounds flying field this morning.

The mail was then rushed to the Medford post office and was forwarded into Ashland on the south-bound train arriving here at 11:10 a. m.

The two planes from Portland arrived at the fair grounds at 8:38 a. m., 23 minutes behind time. They departed on the return trip for Portland at 8:43.

The plane from San Francisco arrived at the fair grounds at 8:49, 35 minutes ahead of time, and departed on the return trip at 9:30 a. m.

The two planes took on 10,040 pieces of mail at the fair grounds, the weight being 155 pounds. The plane from Portland carried 115 pounds of mail. It encountered a heavy fog until it hit the Rogue River valley.

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Division Lines For Schools Announced

Officials Ask That Parents Carefully Observe New Districts

With public schools throughout the city opening their doors next Monday morning for the regular fall and winter terms, school officials ask that parents and patrons carefully observe the division lines between the Washington and Lincoln grade schools.

All pupils in grades from one to six who live east of Third and Gresham to Iowa street and south of Iowa street will go to the Lincoln school. Pupils in these same grades who live west of Third and Gresham streets will go to the Washington grade school.

For this semester all students in the seventh and eighth grades will go to the junior high school, and all students in grades nine to 12, inclusive, will go to the senior high school.

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Aimee Plans For Many New Temples
