**Hospital Report Made** — Only 12 beds remain to be endowed for the Doernbecher Children's hospital in Portland, after a state campaign for funds, according to an announcement yesterday by Mrs. George T. Gerlinger, member of the university board of regents, who is a leader in the campaign. By the first of January it is expected that all of the beds will be named. A gift of \$500 entitles the donor to naming of a bed. Mr. Gerlinger explained, Oregon manufactured goods are being used almost exclusively in furnishing the hospital, such articles as surgical equipment, furniture, bed clothing, and fixtures being secured from state firms, it was announced.

**Air Mail Comes Soon** — Local residents are reminded of the nearness of the opening flight of the coast air mail line next Wednesday, the opening of the county fair. **ENGLAND CONCERNED AT LOW BIRTH RATE**  
Ratio for Present Year is Declared Lowest in Empire's History

LONDON, Sept. 15. — British people keep on marrying, but they are ceasing to have children. Official figures for the three months ended June 30 show a birth rate of only 18.7 babies per 1,000 of population a year — the lowest since the war years of 1917-1918, which are rapidly being approached.

The rate for the corresponding quarter last year was 19.3; also a record except for the war.

But marriage is as popular as ever. The figures for the three months ended June 30 show only 34 below the number for the corresponding period of 1926. The total number of births for the period was 181,455. There was one encouraging feature. There were more male than female births — 92,681 males against 88,774 females, so that around 1944 there will be 3,907 young men left over for the surplus females born during the last few years. Now there are a million surplus women.
