Will Hold Exams For Mail Carrier

The United States Civil Service Commission announces a Post Office, Clerk-Carrier examination for the purpose of establishing an eligible register from which selections may be made to fill vacancies as they may occur in the position of Clerk or Carrier, Post Office Service, at Ashland, Oregon. Salary is \$1700 per annum (for first year at full time); substitute service is paid at the rate of 65c per hour. Applications will be received by the Secretary, Eleventh U. S. Civil Service District, Seattle, Washington, up to the close of business on October 6, 1926. The date of examination will be shown on admission cards furnished applicants. All citizens of the United States who meet the requirements, both men and women, may enter this examination; appointing officers however, have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Age limits, 18 to 45 years on the date of the examination. Age limits do not apply to persons entitled to preference on account of military or naval service.
