UNIVERSITY SQUAD READY FOR SEASON OF HARD FOOTBALL

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Sept. 18.—(Special)—The University football team held its initial fall workout yesterday with 43 candidates, including 10 veterans from the 1926 team, present. It was the largest turnout for fall practice in Oregon's history.

Oregon's winning chances advanced skyward when Captain Al Sinclair, who earlier in the season said he would desert his team to join the aviation corps, reconsidered and took his post as tackle. With Sinclair back, Oregon has a veteran for every position on the line except one and Otto Vitus, plunging halfback, and chief ground gainer for Oregon in the Aggie game last year, has not yet made his appearance and may be entirely lost to the team because of an injury suffered in a football game last year. Vitus' vacancy, should he not report, will be hard to fill, as Captain John J. McEwan, new football coach, had worked all his talent around him and Lynn Jones, fullback.

Oregon's coaching staff now includes three ex-Army coaches, Captain McEwan, Gene Vidal, who will coach the backfield, and Harry Ellinger, head line coach. Spike Leslie will assist with the line, and Bob Mauch with the ends. Leslie coached the freshmen in 1925 and Eugene high school in 1923 and 1924. He is a former star guard on Hugo Besdeck's and Shy Huntington's teams. Mauch captained the Oregon team last year and was named on Pop Warner's all-coast team. The veterans who returned are: Carl Johnson and Nick Carter, centers; Beryl Hodgen and Bert Kerns, guards; Al Sinclair and Homer Dixon, tackles; Sherman Smith, end; George Mimnaugh, quarter; Victor Vetzell, punter and half; and Lynn Jones, full.

WOULD SWITCH PEAR SUIT TO PORTLAND

Attorneys for Defense Want Trial to Come Before Federal Court

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 18. (UP)—Efforts to have the Medford pear suit removed from the circuit court of Jackson county to the federal court here are now under way by federal attorneys. A government brief asking for such a change of venue is now being prepared and will be submitted next Monday to Circuit Judge Charles M. Thomas.

The suit was instituted by G. M. Raymond, receiver for D. R. Hill, Cora Hill and the Sunbelt Orchards against Wendell Vincent, A. J. Brown and H. J. Wickman, the federal department of chemistry and several others.

BIG THEFT OF GOLD BULLION REPORTED

Smelting Company Tells of Loss At its Plant in Contra Costa

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 18.—Gold bullion worth approximately \$125,000 has been stolen from the American Smelting and Refining company's Contra Costa county plant.

In making the robbery known last night, company officials declared that the bullion has been taken systematically for several months and that the plot became known through efforts of the thieves to submit samples to the United States mint here for analysis.

Smelter employes are suspected of the thefts, it being believed by authorities that the bullion was taken from the cauldrons where impurities were taken from the gold.

"LOVE CRIMES" IN SPAIN INCREASING

MADRID (UP)—A wave of "love crimes" is passing over Spain.

For the last three or four months, nearly every day, has added to the list of victims the names of young girls who were either killed or injured by their "novio," or lover.

The latest of these "tragodias de amor" which resulted in the death of two lovers, took place in Ginzco, Galicia. Rafael Boente was engaged to pretty Consuelo Barcela, whose father lived in Cuba. Consuelo's mother was not opposed to the marriage of the couple but demanded they wait until the father had returned from America. Rafael would not listen.

The day he learned there was no chance of getting married immediately he shot his "novia" on the doorstep of her mother's home. Consuelo was only wounded but having closed the door could not go back. She ran to a neighbor's house. Rafael pursued and shot her again, this time fatally. Whereupon, he shot himself and fell dead on the body of his sweetheart.

Grado, in Asturias, was the scene of another typical crime. Amalia Queipo refused to fox-trot with Jose Molina and was stabbed in the back in the midst of a dance.

A few days before, a similar drama had taken place in Almeria where the ex-novia of a senator belonging to a prominent family assassinated her in the Casino Municipal.

In most cases, it is the man who murders the woman, but in several instances the woman acted first, with the same fatal results. Spanish love is still as dangerous as ever and Carmen's "Beware!" remains unchanged.
