A. Gammill, Home Economics secretary for Jackson county.
 Yesterday's Tidings carried a resume of the splendid addresses made at this meeting. No one present need plead ignorance of the health work being done in the city or in Jackson county in an organized, comprehensive and constructive way, and all were made aware of the way the women of Ashland may get behind the city's hospital in a helpful fashion.
 In opening the business session, with Mrs. Harris Dean, president, in charge, the salute of the flag was given, and "America the Beautiful" the club song, sung by every one present. The salute was led by Mrs. J. P. Dodge, past Regent of Mount Ashland Chapter of the D. A. R.
