frequency of 100,000 vibrations. Dr. E. E. Hall, physicist at the University of California who witnessed the feat offered some explanation but failed to show scientific cause.

"The gas flame was set in a tube," Dr. Hall explained. "A properly pitched sound will set both flame and gas into vibration, which causes the flame's extinction."
