

RACE RIOTS START IN STRICKEN CITY

Negroes Caught Looting Store and Are Shot by Marine Guards

MIAMI, Fla., Sept. 24.—(UP)—Race rioting broke out this afternoon in devastated Miami. Marine guards caught two negroes in the act of looting a store in the colored section. The negroes were shot and wounded and only the arrival of 60 police officers with riot guns, 25 deputy sheriffs and two companies of state troops prevented more casualties. Armed forces were rushed to the negro district and posted guards at all corners. Two marines, in addition to the negro looters, were shot and seriously wounded.

BORDEN ANNOUNCES COMPLETE PLATFORM

Newton W. Borden of Medford, democratic candidate for representative in congress from this district, this week issued an extended platform of his beliefs and principles, and intends to

wage an aggressive campaign between now and election time.

Following is his complete platform:

"I believe that the economic condition of the farmer will never be satisfactorily improved as long as he is compelled to sell in an open world market and buy everything in a protected market. I therefore favor a readjustment of tariff rates.

"Labor is not a commodity, but human, and should have the right to organize for its own protection and that of child life, and to prevent debilitating employment of women.

"The nation should conserve its natural resources and retain title to its water power.

"The Roosevelt Highway should be encouraged by the Federal Government for economic and defense purposes.

"Railroad rates should be based upon actual investment and cost of operation; good roads are indispensable and should be further extended by Federal aid; and there should be an Ameri-

can-owned, built and manned merchant marine.

"I favor a graduated income tax, and such tax reductions that the farmer and laborer can maintain their homes, and standards of living. Am opposed to the so-called Dennis Resolution.

"There should be a strict enforcement of all laws, including the Volstead Act, and the enforcement of the latter taken out of politics.

"I am in favor of the Direct Primary.

"I stand for a square deal for all ex-service men.

"I favor all necessary river and harbor improvements, and irrigation and reclamation projects for Oregon.

"I favor a restrictive immigration policy, and raising of the

standards for admission. Am opposed to employment of Japanese labor.

"Our government should extend its generosity to the American tax-payer rather than to foreign nations that try to evade payment of honest war debts, which should be paid.

"Had I been in Congress at the time, the Oregon-California Land Grant Tax Committee would have had no trouble in getting me to introduce their bill in the House of Representatives. "Congressional representatives of New England manufacturers should be elected in New England and not in Oregon."

ENGLISH COAL STRIKE MAKING MODERN HOMES

LONDON, (UP)—The coal strike is driving English housewives headlong into modernity. Never has there been so lively a demand for gas and electric housekeeping equipment as is re-

ported now by the dealers. Gas stoves and gas ovens are replacing the old-fashioned coal ranges over which British women have toiled for generations. Electrical equipment is appearing on hundreds of British breakfast tables, to simplify housekeeping and avoid the shortage of coal. Gas furnaces are also being installed in many homes. A shortage of domestic serv-

ants has also helped to accelerate the demand for labor-saving and time-saving household equipment. English wives are adopting their own work and they inevitably demand all the modern comforts and assistances available.
