This materially affects Klamath nimrods as Tule lake, famous hunting grounds, is in Modoc county, California. So hunters will not be able to invade the marshes and grain fields of Tule lake until 16 days after the Oregon season opens.

The Crater Lake season, which ends next Thursday, September 30, is the most successful season ever enjoyed at that world-famed wonder, far over 80,000 persons have visited the national park from all parts of the United States and many foreign countries since the opening of the season July 1 last. Next Thursday forenoon the lodge will be closed and the other concessions ended, and the stages will bring down to Medford those of the lodge crew of employes and officials still on duty at the flag end of the season. The staff of employes has been gradually decreased since Labor day. It will be the last run of the stages, also, for the season. While the lodge will be closed and the season officially at an end, many local and other people will continue to make trips to Crater Lake as long as the weather permits.—Medford Mail Tribune.
