Whereas, the said C. M. Thomas has been so uniformly courteous and fair to the members of this bar, and has at all times stood for constructive reforms in the legal procedure of the state and possesses the essential high qualities and ability that go to make an efficient judge, be it therefore,

Resolved, that the Southern Oregon Bar Association in regular meeting this 28th day of September, 1928, unanimously endorse the appointment of the Hon. C. M. Thomas to fill the vacancy upon said Federal Bench, and be it further

Resolved, that a copy of these Resolutions be mailed to the President of the United States and to each of the Senators from

Oregon.

The meeting was attended by some forty members from Grants Pass, Medford and Ashland. Attorney A. C. Hough of Grants Pass, in presenting the resolution, in part, said: "In my thirty years in the practice of law I have worked before many judges on both the Federal and State benches, and I can say to you frankly and sincerely that my work with Judge Thomas has been the most pleasant and satisfactory of any judge I have ever known. He is human, courteous and fair minded, and yet has with almost super-human energy cleaned up the court work in this district to a point where it is now running on an efficient, strictly business like basis. Indeed Oregon would be most fortunate to have on the Federal Bench a man so well fitted to fill that responsible position."

At this meeting petitions signed by all the members of the bar of Douglas, Josephine, Jackson and Klamath counties were presented, and have been forwarded for consideration. The committee also announced that they were assured the support of Lane, Deschutes, Crook, Jefferson and Lake counties.

NORWAY SPECULATES ON ROYAL MARRIAGE

OSLO, (UP)—Norway's royal ty and smart social set is much interested this fall in the matrimonial intentions of Crown Prince Olav who is one of the most dashing and handsome of Europe's eligible princes.

Prince Olav was 24 last July. Everyone hopes that before long he will choose a bride but just whom he will choose is a matter that is subject for much speculation in Norway.

When the Swedish Prince Carl, a son of the late King Oscar II, of Sweden, came to Norway last autumn with his two daughters, it was believed that one of these princesses would be chosen. This speculation was given added impetus when the Crown Prince had himself photographed in full uniform with all his orders on his breast. Photographing of members of the Royal family is very uncommon in Norway.

Hopes were wrecked when Prince Carl and Princess Ingeborg, King Haakon's sister, returned home with their daughters un betrothed.

More recently, came the announcement that Prince Carl with his consort and daughters was again to visit the Norwegian court. Many were again certain that the engagement would be announced, but there was another disappointment. After 8 days' stay, Carl, Ingeborg and all three daughters, left for home, without anything happening.

Rumour now asserts that these visits were merely intended to conceal a not confirmed plan, which is said to be an alliance between the Norwegian Crown Prince and the Swedish Crown Prince's daughter, Ingrid, a young and beautiful princess.

Crown Prince Olav is very popular in Norway. He is expert in skiing, rowing and sailing. He will be the first Norwegian King after the lapse of 500 years, who will speak the undiluted Norwegian language.

In Norway it would be hailed with un mixed satisfaction if he should choose a Swedish princess as his consort. It would further strengthen the good relations existing between Norway, Sweden, and Denmark.

Streetcar Lines To Be Abandoned

LOGAN, Utah, Sept. 20. — (UP) — Logan has decided to abandon its street car lines and adopt motor buses. It is the first Utah city of the first class to adopt the system of rubber-tired public conveyance.

An order issued by the Logan public utilities commission provides for elimination of the street car service operated by the Utah-Idaho Central railroad and that permission be granted the same company for motor bus transportation.
