JUDICIAL COUNCIL WILL MEET SHORTLY

Circuit Judge Thomas to Attend Important Portland Session

JACKSONVILLE, Ore., Sept. 30. (Special) — By order of Chief Justice Thomas A. McBride of the Supreme Court, the Judicial Council of Oregon will convene at Portland the last of this week to consider several important matters in connection with the judicial program of the state. Judge C. M. Thomas, of this district, who is a member of this Council will leave for the north to be present at the meeting.

The Judicial Council, created by the Legislature in 1923, and composed of Chief Justice McBride, Associate Justice John L. Rand, of the Supreme Court; Judge C. M. Thomas, of Medford; Judge Walter H. Evans, of Portland, and Judge Fred A. Wilson, of The Dalles, is working in close cooperation with the bar of

the state, looking to a reformation of the court practice in the state, to the end that it may be placed on a business-like basis, and thus afford a speedy adjustment of the rights of persons to resort to the courts.
