STEWER TALKS TO LOCAL KIWANIS CLUB

Characterizing Oregon's seeming willingness to passively accept second place in so far as the federal government was concerned as an "inferior complex" and that being the main reason why this state has not advanced as rapidly as the states on the north and south at its boundary lines, Fred Steiwer, republican nominee for the United States Senate, urged members of the Ashland Kiwanis club at their Friday meeting to take a greater interest in the protection of the natural resources and advantages with which this state abounds. Tracing the history of Oregon from its earliest period the speaker brought the members of the club up to the time it became a state and turned his oratorical guns to bear particularly upon the generous attitude adopted in granting legally to the federal government the ownership of the great public domain which forms a large part of this state. This he declared had cost Oregon untold amounts and had acted largely to retard the growth and expansion to which the state was naturally entitled. This situation he emphatically brought to the attention of the Kiwanians, should place this state in the light of being the favored son of the federal government, and that instead of going before the government on the bended knee of a plea for patronage should place Oregon in the position of being able to demand and receive that which was her natural heritage. He further urged that the splendid spirit which had been responsible for the building of communities, roads, schools and all things that had placed it on the path of becoming one of the greatest states in the union be continued and strengthened and complimented the Kiwanis and other service clubs upon the splendid work they were doing along this line. The members of the club voted unanimously to appoint a committee of three to investigate and report back the plans adopted for the city water supply, and chairman of the meeting, Vic Miller, named O. F. Carson, Tom Simpson and F. F. Whittle on this committee. Mrs. William Briggs, accompanied by Miss Pearson, favored the club with a solo, and graciously responded with an encore.

HARRY WILLS WILL MEET JACK SHARKY

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—The logical contender for Gene Tunney's shiny new crown will be known by the evening of Columbus day. Regardless of Tex Rickard's plans for a heavyweight elimination contest, there are only two outstanding men—aside from the deposed champion, Jack Dempsey—who would have a real chance against Tunney. These men are Harry Wills of Harlem and Jack Sharky of Edson, and it has been arranged to have them fight it out on the afternoon of October 12 at Hoboken field, Brooklyn, under the direction of Humbert J. Fugazy. Tex Rickard's only rival in the promoting of boxing bouts—the suave, smiling Italian who put on the Berloni-Delaney and other championship contests—arranged with Paddy Mullins to have Wills meet Sharky before bombarding Tunney with challenges. If the big negro can dispose of the clever Boston heavyweight, he will find many to support his claim to a title bout with the new champion.
