WASHINGTON - Governor Albert C. Ritchie of Maryland is now unmistakably in the limelight as a Democratic presidential possibility."

It may or may not have to compete with Atlee Pomerene's. In case Pomerene's elected to the Senate from Ohio he'll have a powerful limelight, but if he'

beaten he won't have any. Senator Jim Reced's limelight isn't turned on full blast as yet, and its too soon to predict how much it will brighten, or whether it will go out altogether.

In the opinion of politicians Senator Jim was a little too slow in getting into the presidential limelight.


