Stewart's WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON — Governor Albert C. Ritchie of Maryland is now unmistakably in the limelight as a Democratic presidential possibility.

It all depended on his renomination as chief executive of the Cockade State at the recent primary. Beaten, he'd have been out of consideration for the presidency. Overwhelmingly victorious, he's in the running.

It remains for him to be re-elected in November, and Maryland isn't always a Democratic state, but it always is except when there's disunion in the state Democracy's ranks, and there are no signs of it as present.

So it's reasonably safe to assume that the governor will announce majority.

Ritchie's limelight isn't quite as bright as Al Smith's or William G. McAdoo's.

If, however, Smith and McAdoo's limelights cancel one another in 1928, as they did in 1924, then Ritchie's limelight will be about as good as anybody's.

It may or may not have to compete with Allee Pomerene's.

In case Pomerene's elected to the Senate from Ohio he'll have a powerful limelight, but if he's beaten he won't have any.

Senator Jim Reed's limelight isn't turned on full blast as yet, and it's too soon to predict how much it will brighten, or whether it will go out altogether.

In the opinion of politicians, Senator Jim was a little too slow in getting into the presidential limelight.

MANY MILLIONS ARE SPENT ON DRY LAW

Enforcement of Prohibition Has Cost Immense Sum to Date

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Enforcement of the United States law more than \$114,784,000 thus far. And in addition to this money outlay, 335 persons have lost their lives in the civil wars between federal forces and bootleggers.

These statistics were obtained by the United Press at the treasury from government reports.

Operation of the prohibition unit, including money to be spent up to the close of the fiscal year June 30, 1927, has announced to \$12,902,513. Coast guard activities for the prevention of rum smuggling have cost \$521,560.

Millions of dollars have been spent by the justice department for prosecution of liquor cases but no record of the amount is kept.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Placed in the wreckage of his truck which had skidded on the wet pavement and hit an elevated pillar, Roy Williams calmly smoked cigarettes and joked with his rescuers as he directed the work of 70 firemen summoned to extricate him. It took half an hour to dig him out.
