Federal mine inspectors said it was hardly possible that any of the men in the explosion could be alive. Rescue workers disregarded the warnings of poison gas and are searching the mine.

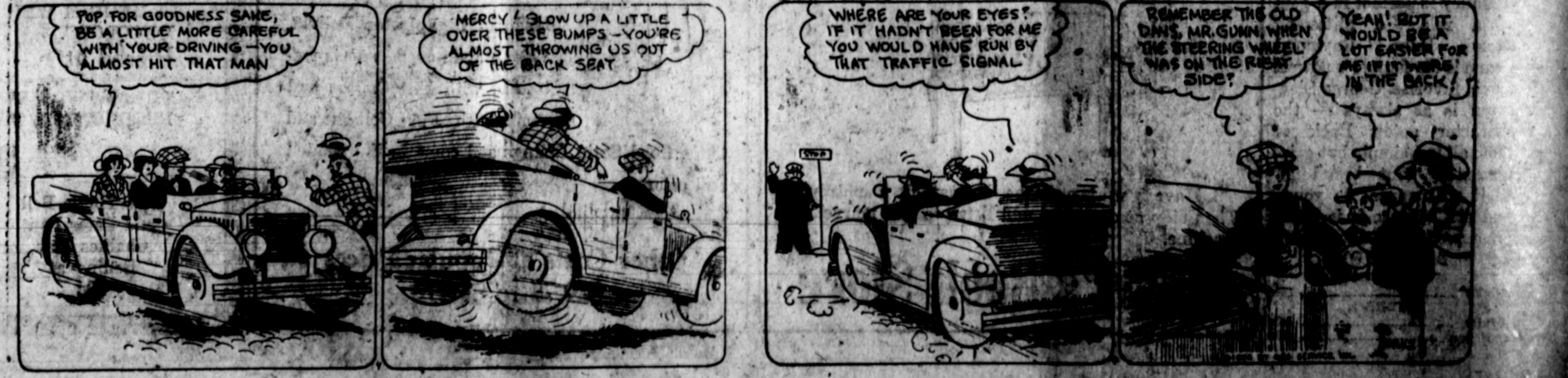
