THE FORUM

Editor Ashland Tidings:

As a location for a happy and prosperous community Ashland is blessed with many natural advantages; and one of the greatest is the wonderful pure water.

Like all cities that have grown from mere villages so Ashland must meet the water question.

I don't think any one will question the need of a more adequate supply during the summer months at least. But it seems to me more a question of conserving it when there is an abundance.

Where Ashland will require thousands for this improvement other cities require millions.

To keep pace with the increase in population and the advantages of municipal ownership it is self evident the annual expenses must steadily increase.

Therefore it is the duty of every citizen to turn out and vote for a better water supply.

Borrowing money by issuing bonds to build a public utility is just the same as a man borrowing money to build a home on long time repayments when he doesn't have the cash himself. But no doubt there are some who would not borrow even for that. They ought to go and live in a tent on the desert where they won't need any water works.

There are others who will vote no because they feel that the method of raising the revenue to meet the principal and interest on the bonds is unjust.

It is proposed by some of the present council to raise the water rate to meet these obligations together with some other proposed improvements that should have been included in the bond issue, but if submitted to the voters might jeopardize the whole thing.

Then they tell us this bond issue will not increase the general taxes of the people of Ashland one cent.

Tell that to the man in the wagon. The water and light rates are another form of taxation, the difference is only in

With the installation of a water supply to meet the needs of fifteen or twenty thousand there will be a great increase in the value of all vacant land within the city limits. So it would be perfectly fair to call on the owners of this vacant land to help meet this expense in proportion to the increase in value, and this can only be done by an increase in taxes.

About seventy-five percent of the land is vacant, therefore by the proposed method twenty-five percent must inevitably carry this burden, and that will necessitate the water rate being almost treble.

A municipal water works is a public utility like sewerage, pavement, library etc., and not a commodity to be sold to the citizens like groceries, as some would have us believe and as a utility should be maintained and paid for by an equitable system of taxation applied on all land value within the city limits.

This would make Ashland a poor place for speculators, but a very desirable place for home-builders to live in. Providé adequate funds for all public works at the same time lessen the burden of those least able to bear it. It will be easy to borrow money but let us see if that the new council is pledged to this step in the right direction. Such a pledge will secure their election and also carry the bond issue. All pull together for a better and more beautiful Ashland.
