WILD TURKEYS WILL THRIVE IN OREGON

State Game Warden Says Experiments Are Proving a Success

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 7. (United News) — According to E. F. Averill, state game warden, who has returned from Curry county, wild turkeys show great promise of becoming a game bird

available to Oregon hunters.

Of 68 wild turkeys released in Curry county, only two have succumbed, and the remainder are making meals on acorns of the white, black and chinkapin oak trees in this section.

Tame turkeys have for years been allowed to forage in the woods by ranchers in the county, and it is believed that wild turkeys will be as successful in finding food.
