CREAMY SNOWDRIFT helps the biscuit-maker

BISCUITS
2 Cups Flour
4 Teaspoons Baking Powder
1 Teaspoon Salt
1 Teaspoon Sugar
4 Tablespoons Snowdrift
3/4 Cup Milk

Sift dry ingredients together. Pinch in the shortening, not too thoroughly, and add the milk all at one time. Cut and fold the dough until smooth and elastic. Take out on a floured board and pat and roll to about one-fourth inch in thickness. Form with large biscuit cutter and bake in oven 450 degrees F. (hot) for about ten minutes.

No Promises Made
The speaker declared that he had made no promises or pledges since he first announced his candidacy before the primaries, nor would he make any now, except those which he is making to the voters generally in public.

"But I desire to add another public promise to those I have already made the voters, and that is this," he said:

"If I am elected, as I expect to be, I promise you that I will devote four years of hard work, giving the state the same undivided attention as I have given my own personal affairs during the past years, knowing I must do so

to succeed. I also promise you I will not make Oregon a speaking circuit for the next four years."

Other Speakers
C. E. Gates, ex-mayor of Medford, spoke briefly, in which he recounted many humorous incidents of the recent state fair at Salem, which brought home the fact that Governor Pierce is flooding the entire state with campaign literature. Mr. Gates predicted this year would bring a sweeping republican victory for the entire state and national ticket.

Billy Briggs, republican nominee for state representative, E. V. Carter, veteran Jackson county republican, and Mrs. D. Peruzzi, a member of the republican state committee, also spoke.

Senator George W. Dunn presided and introduced Senator Patterson and other speakers.
