The trottier frock of fine twill with cape and full sleeves is one of the most pleasing models of the season, and it supplies a chic original frock which many other dresses are copied in. The design pictured to the left fastens straight down the front, and has a patch pocket on the right side. The neck may be buttoned high or the fronts unbuttoned and rolled to form revers. Medium size requires 4 yards 34-inch material.

Printed silk can be used to splendid effect in reproducing the dress to the right. The deep V-shaped opening in front is filled in with an inset yoke, and the close-fitting sleeves are lengthened with puffs which are gathered to wrists of self-material. Medium size requires 4 1/2 yards 36-inch printed and 1 1/4 yards plain silk.

A year ago this fall Camp Fire was organized in Ashland through the schools. It began with two groups in Senior High School, was followed by two Junior High groups and one group in the grade schools. One hundred girls in all were enrolled in the local organization during the year.

The Camp Fire aims to fill for girls the place that Boy Scouts fills for the boys. It specializes in training in homecraft, citizenship, nature-lore, campcraft, health and handicraft work. Its aim is to give the girl profitable recreation under trained leadership and wholesome companionship.

Realizing the value of such an organization the people of Ashland gave their hearty support to Camp Fire during the past year. The Kiwanis Club pledged its support. During the past summer Miss Mary Squire, National Field Worker for Camp Fire, visited Ashland. All utilities are publicly owned. Their stockholders are representative of every business and of every walk in life, and in a true sense represent the general public.
