LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

To the Editor:

The undersigned and three other parties took a trip up the Ashland creek canyon a few days ago to prospect and look up a suitable site for a dam in Ashland creek watershed of which there is so much talk and argument pro and con for its location.

The best one that we could find is the Watson Cabin or his homestead, situated about three miles from the post office. We went up 80 feet on the mountain side, put the level on a stump and it was a surprise to us how much ground it covered up Ashland creek and Reeder's Gulch.

A dam 80 feet high and 275 long on the top would hold about 120 million gallons of water. By making the dam 100 feet high it would hold approximately 200 millions. The cost of a wall 80 feet high would be about \$125,000 and a wall 100 feet high would cost about \$200,000 or less.

We figured that we could make a contract with some one to get the wood for the clearing of it, then when the water gets high this winter, put in a temporary hydraulic pipe and sluice off the

dirt and soil which would increase the capacity of the dam another 10 million gallons. Crush the boulders for the concrete, thereby making use of them too. We found the bedrock where the fall for the dam should be right in the bottom of the creek and solid mountain rock on both sides so there would be no trouble to get anchorage for the wall.

The men who were with me are

good, loyal, economical and honest men who have the interest of our city at heart and want to do anything that is fair for the promotion of more water and at a cost of not more than \$200,000. I am sure that our voters at the election would go strong for the above sum, while on the other hand, the expenditure of nearly a half million will be voted down and lost.
