JACK SHARKEY WINS FROM HARRY WILLS

EBBETS FIELD, BROOKLYN, Oct. 13.—Jack Sharkey of Boston knocked all the championship aspirations out of big Harry Wills of Harlem, in their scheduled 15-round bout before a capacity crowd at Ebbets Field Tuesday night, but the fight ended in the thirteenth, when the negro, who had bragged so much of what he would do to certain heavyweight champions, was thrown out of the ring for continuous foul fighting.

Wills was a badly whipped fighter, and had been outclassed, outpunched and outgamed in every round of the contest before the referee, Patsy Haley, finally could stand no longer the negro's foul work, and ordered him to his corner.

Patsy Haley would have been justified in stopping the contest long before he did, for the black's favorite tactics of hiding and pounding his opponent on the back and of swinging backhand punches coming out of clinches, began before the first bell's echoes had died away.

Sharkey won 12 rounds and one might have been classed as even. The Bostonian's work was overshadowed by the negro's fouls, however, and the crowd of 35,000 which apparently was entirely for Sharkey kept constantly crying to the referee to throw Wills out of the ring.
