With two golf professionals here giving daily lessons, and with five temporary greens now ready for play at the Ashland Golf club course south of the city, increasing interest is being shown in this sport, according to Louis Dodge, president of the club.

Mr. Dodge announced this morning that any man or woman in Ashland is welcomed to the course for play on the temporary greens at any time they may desire. No restrictions will be made for several months, and club officials extend a general invitation who might desire to learn the game.

Six holes and five fairways have now been roughed in under the direction of W. J. Wade, golf pro who is superintending the work. The five temporary greens will now permit of good play for those who desire to take advantage of the temporary course.

POLKA DOTS AND STRIPES

Fashion is featuring polka dots and stripes in all of their variations this season. The frock pictured to the left is in washable silk, trimmed with plain crepe de Chine. There are inverted plaits on either side of the front of the skirt, and the blouse falls gracefully over a sash of plain crepe. Medium size requires 4 yards 36-inch dotted and 3/4 yard plain material.

Stripes fit smartly into the scheme of the straightline one-piece frock. The second frock is in gingham, trimmed with heavy white linen. The pockets and collar are stitched with braid in two or three pastel tints. After slashing, the fronts are underfaced with self-material, then rolled back to form revers. Medium size requires 2 3/4 yards 36-inch striped and 1 yard plain material.

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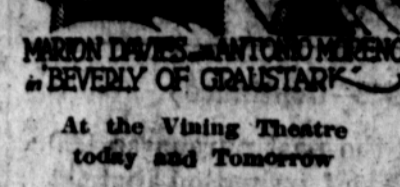
