

GRANTS DISMISSAL OF DAMAGE ACTION

Federal Judge Throws Out Mining Case Involving \$159,000

PORTLAND, Oct. 15.—(United News)—Insufficient evidence and expiration of time limit under the statute were cited by federal Judge Bean Thursday as reasons for granting a motion for the dismissal of the damage action of Charles E. Sowder and Judge Ward E. Watson of Indian against the Bourne Gold Mining company, Ladd and Tilton, William Ladd and John Thomas. Dr. Sowder and Judge Watson had asked for 159,000 damages, alleging they had been deceived in the purchase of a gold mine near Baker, Ore.

PRINCE OF WALES NOT TO BE MARRIED

HANFORD, Cal., Oct. 15.—(United News)—Because a pet goat wandered into a neighbor's back yard and ate flowers, two women engaged in a duel with hatchet and pistol, and one may die. Mrs. Mary Eno's goat visited Mrs. Pearl Sousa's yard, and after an argument the former charged Mrs. Sousa with a hatchet. During the ensuing battle Mrs. Sousa seized a pistol and shot Mrs. Eno through the abdomen. Mrs. Sousa is in jail, charged with assault with intent to kill.

INTRIGUING PREDICTIONS CONCERNING RADIO

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—(United News)—Intriguing predictions concerning the future possibilities of radio were made here by A. J. Musselman, Chicago scientist at the Chicago radio show. "Possibly within the next 20 years we can talk with any one at any other point on this earth and not only talk to, but see the other person," Musselman said. "For example, the housewife may visit the grocer by radio, talk to the clerks, look over the stocks, pick out a steak or a brick of cheese and enjoy every advantage of being at the grocery, except tasting or smelling her purchases."

GEORGE BURNS HELD BEST BALL PLAYER

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—(United Press)—George H. Burns, the Cleveland first baseman who broke Tris Speaker's two base hit record in the last season, has been chosen as the most valuable player in the American league. Burns registered a total of 63 out of a possible 64 points in the scoring of the league's committee and was named unanimously as the honor player of 1926.

In announcing the award, the committee of sports writers pointed out that Burns' 1926 batting average was .358, that he made 64 two base hits and that he batted 114 runs. Speaker's two base hit record was 60. The name of Burns now enters the roll of honor, which already contains such names as Ty Cobb, Tris Speaker, Eddie Collins, George Sisler, Babe Ruth, Walter Johnson and Roger Peckinpaugh.

Tourist is Shot By Grants Pass Police Yesterday

GRANTS PASS, Oct. 15.—R. A. Kirkland of Chicago was shot through both arms late Thursday when he did not stop quick enough after Policeman Bert Kenyon had halted his car. Kenyon said he had been advised to watch out for a car from Seattle.

He thought Kirkland was the man wanted and shot when he thought the man in the car was reaching for his gun. Mrs. Kirkland said she thought it was a hold up, as Kenyon was not in uniform. Witnesses say that the car had almost stopped when the shot was fired. The wounds were not considered serious.

Illinois Man is Named Head of American Legion

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 15.—Howard Paul Savage of Illinois, former lieutenant of engineers, was today elected National Commander of the American Legion on the twenty-second ballot. The naming of Lieutenant Perry came after a spirited contest in which J. Munroe Johnson of South Carolina, had gathered sufficient votes to deadlock the convention, neither candidate succeeding in getting a majority until twenty-two ballots had been taken. Mrs. Adeline Wright of Menomonie, Wis., was elected president of the National Woman's Auxiliary of the American Legion.

there so that prohibitionists could unite on Frank Smith. Magill refused. Safford then brought the national dry organization into the fight and it has just issued a call to Illinois dry to scratch Magill and concentrate on Smith lest George Brennan, wet democratic candidate win through a split in the opposition.

The Anti-saloon league also has issued a call to its Ohio followers to defeat Ailes Pomerene, the democratic candidate for the senate. In New York it is out to punish senator Wadsworth, an erstwhile dry, for turning wet, by sponsoring a dry independent republican, even at the possible cost of throwing the senatorship to Wagner, the Tammany democrat.

After Victories As Wheeler said in his statement defending the league's course, this is a practical question for the dries. They figure on the possibility that New York referendum will go wet. It may not. But the dries are assuming for the purposes of strategy that it will. Therefore they must offset this with striking personal victories in other states. If they can beat such a sturdy candidate as Pomerene in Ohio on the wet issue, Brennan in Illinois, Hawes in Missouri and a few more like those, they can offset the effect of any New York reverse in the public mind.

Public Opinion Right now it is this question of public opinion that is vital to the dries. Their problem is to impress the public that the country is predominantly dry. If the impending elections leave the impression—whatever the real facts may be—that the country is undergoing a reaction back to beer and wine, they will be in trouble. Their strategy now is to demonstrate that the country as a whole is dry. New York, as a lone wet spot, won't bother them if they can produce a dry victory in Illinois.

The underlying fact is that the tendency of public opinion in the next two years leading up to the presidential fight will be determined by the approaching election.


