The president also emphasized the necessity of obedience to law, without mention prohibition or any other specific question.

"An imperative necessity makes another requirement of good citizenship to be obedience to law," he continued. "This is

the first requisite of all government that is worthy of the name, observance of the law is the very essence of self government."

He also remarked that each country must work out its own form of government, that the United States cannot impose democracy on any nation and that some people are better fitted for submission to monarchical forms.

"We could not superimpose

our institutions upon other nations. The best service that we can render foreign countries in that direction is to leave them ample of the mistakes and successes of each other."
