Handwriting Found at Car-mel is Identified By Expert

PROSECUTION CLOSES

Religious Leader Carried Into Court And Hears Testimony

United News Staff Correspondent LOS ANGELES, Oct. 20. -(United News) - On the walls of Angelus temple a handwriting dramatically significant to Aimee Semple McPherson as the four words of biblican legend were to the ancient feasters of Babylon was scrawled by the prosecution late Tuesday as the state brought its case against the famous evangelist to a close.

"Mene, mene, tekel, upharsin," the invisible hand wrote on the wall of the banquet room at Belshazzar's feast, but in their place the state substituted "Prunes. Pears, Bran and Tapioca."

Damaging Testimony Thes words, written on a grocery slip found at the Carmel "love cottage" were identified by a handwriting expert, who testifled they were written by the same hand that penned the "light of darkness' sermon, which the evangelist has admitted was written by her.

And with these drab emblems of domesticity the state contends. they have linked the famous evangelist with an amorous vacation with Kenneth G. Ormiston, her former radio operator, at Carmel-by-the-Sea, while the evangelist was supposed to have been the captive of kidnapers.

Aimee Appears
The lethargie atmospher which pervaded the case as it dragged into the fourth week was dispelled when the evangelist was carried into the courtroom Tuesday in a wicker armchair, suffering, it was reported from gangrene poisoning, result-

That The People May Know

There has been so much misunderstanding concerning the proposed increase in rates if the water bonds should carry, that this article will seek to shed further light on this question, that there might be no misconception of what the people of Ashland might expect.

It must be understood now and for all time that the water rates must be increased whether the bond issue carries or not. Sound business methods compel an increase in rates as the city of Ashland, at the present time, is furnishing water at less than cost.

No private concern can long remain in business. and sell its commodity at less than cost. The people do not expect it, nor should they expect it. The same holds true with the municipal corporation.

The increase in rates which has been proposed and which will soon become effective, will be approximately 80 percent higher than the present rates. Even with this increased water charge, Ashland consumers will be getting their water cheaper than the people of Medford. They will be getting water cheaper than practically every city of the same size in Oregon, and what is more, they will be getting better water than do most of these other cities.

The present water distribution system in Ashland is wholly inadequate, with many pipes leaking and almost worn out. In many places there are two-inch mains where they should be four inches, and four-inch mains where they should be six inches. It is estimated that close to 25 percent of the present water supply is lost through these leaking, worn out pipe lines.

There is only one way in which this can be corrected. That is the construction of new mains and a general replacement of the present distribution system, together with a much-needed equalization reservoir to reduce the present pressure.

It would be useless, according to members of the council and their engineers, to authorize the construction of a new storage dam in Ashlnad Creek canyon unless authority is given to repair and enlarge the present distribution system. In fact, both projects are so closely interwoven that one cannot fulfill its purpose without the other.
