SECRETARY RETURNS FROM "Y" MEETING

W. P. Walter Reports on Assembly Held at Longview, Wash.

W. P. Walter, secretary of the local Y. M. C. A., returned with his family last evening from Longview, Wash., where he attended the Northwest Assembly for work with boys and young men, which was held under the auspices of the Northwest Council of the Young Men's Christian Associations. The assembly was organized about a year ago and has grown beyond the hopes of its organizers, according to the local secretary. "This is not a convention or a conference, but a group of older boys and men working on different commissions seeking to work out and help solve the many problems of the boys and young men" of today," Mr. Walter explained. There were ten commissions at work during the assembly. The H-Y commission, Pioneer, Comrade, Boy's Camp, Friendly Indian building work, young men's division, World Brotherhood and Christian emphasis commissions. The assembly membership is composed of laymen, older boys, young men and secretaries of the Y. M. C. A., the attendance being about evenly divided. The next assembly will be in February and will be held at the Moran school for boys, on Bainbridge Island, Seattle.

so this episode convinced them and as a result George, at the age of fifteen years, was taken to Bridgewater where he was apprenticed to a draper. Five years later he went to work in the drapery establishment of Messrs. Hitchcock & Rogers in London. Conditions were of the very best for young men in these establishments in those days, and young Williams in an endeavor to help these young men, had a meeting with eleven others about his own age, in his room on the evening of June 5th, 1844. This memorable meeting was the beginning of what is now known throughout the world as, the Young Men's Christian Association. Williams was just 22 years of age at this time, a young man of sterling Christian character and with the courage of his convictions. A later years he was knighted by Queen Elizabeth as a tribute to the great service he had rendered human kind. He has since been known as Sir George Williams. Sir George never was an employed officer of the Y. M. C. A., but gave of his time, talent and wealth; (for he later became wealthy) generously, that this organization might fulfil the mission for which it had been organized.

Wm. M. Briggs, present candidate for representative to the Oregon legislature, was born in the city of Ashland, in this county, in 1896. He is a Jackson County product.

He received his common and high school training in the public schools of Ashland, and his legal education at Valparaiso University, Indiana, at which latter place he graduated with honors.

Mr. Briggs enlisted in the army in May, 1917, and at the close of the war was discharged with a commission as First Lieutenant Infantry.

Returning home after the war, Mr. Briggs immediately turned his attention to the practice of law with his father at Ashland, under the firm name of Briggs & Briggs. He was admitted to the Indiana bar in 1917, and to the Oregon bar in 1919.

In 1919 Mr. Briggs was appointed city attorney of Ashland, and has held that position without interruption since that time, through various city administrations.

From 1920 to 1923 Mr. Briggs was the Captain of the Ashland battery of Coast Artillery. He still holds a Captain's commission in the Officer's Reserve Corps. During the period he was in command of the Ashland battery he was a member of the General Staff of the State of Oregon.

Mr. Briggs is making his first entry into politics, though he has given a great deal of service in civic matters through his work and interest in the various civic organizations of his locality.

WOMAN POSING AS MAN GOES YEARS UNDETECTED

MILAN — (AP) — A woman cobbler who lived for years here working peacefully in the quarter of Viale Umbria disguised as a man, and living with another woman as wife has just been discovered.

The cobbler, by name Ernesto Latino, about 40 years of age, smoked, and drank with other men of his trade, and played a rare hand at cards.

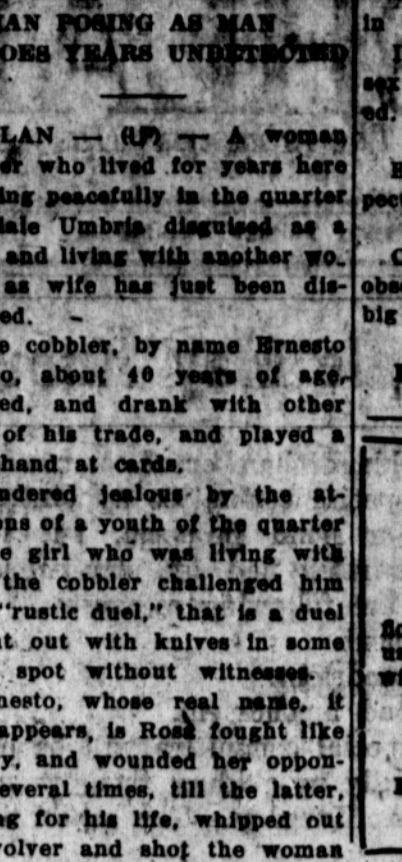
