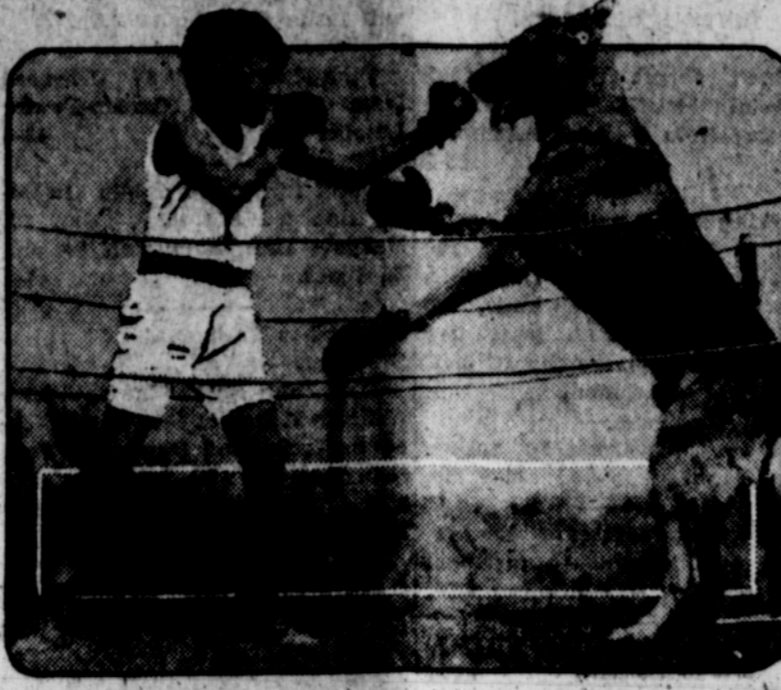

EARTH'S GREATEST CONFLICT IS NEAR

The announcement that the world is facing the greatest time of trouble it has ever experienced was made in all seriousness from the platform of Wimer Hall by H. S. Murray, of New York City. The assertion was, however, made without pessimism; for it was pointed out that the inevitable trouble was only a certain proof that the kingdom of God, under Christ as King, was about to begin operations in the earth.

The speaker pointed out among other things, that many people have the thought that when Christ's kingdom begins to exercise authority in the earth it will bring immediate peace and harmony. This, he said, is not the proper thought; for many passages in both the Old and the New Testament show that when the reign of righteousness is introduced there will be much opposition on the part of men and nations, and that there opposing influences and forces must first be overcome. The Second Psalm was cited as picturing conditions when Christ begins his reign. It speaks of the nations assembling and the peoples imagining a vain thing in opposition to the onward march of the Prince of Peace and Righteousness. In this Psalm, which the speaker pointed out as now having its fulfillment, the people and the rulers are counseled to submit themselves willingly to the power of Christ. The Psalm indicates that those who refuse to do so will perish from the earth. This being the case, said the speaker, we can see a reason for the world-wide trouble which the scriptures indicate will precede the thousand years of

The conflict, the speaker stated, is really between Jehovah and Christ and the forces of righteousness on the one hand, and Satan and the forces of evil on the other hand. In Revelation 19:11 to 21 we have the final conflict graphically portrayed under striking symbolism. The armies of Jehovah are represented as under the leadership of Christ, who is the King of kings and Lord of lords. These do not use carnal or material weapons. Their weapon is the truth. The armies of wickedness are seen to be under the control of an organization called "the beast," and they are encouraged in their opposition to the Lord and his Messiah by an aggregation designated as "the false prophet." The "false prophet" combine is composed of faithless religionists who presume to represent God to the people, but who are in reality following their own way and ignoring God's revelation. It is not surprising to find them here associated with that great system of oppression and fraud here characterized as "the beast." But in spite of their apparent power, the armies of unrighteousness are vanquished and the systems of evil are destroyed. The destruction is represented by a lake of fire and brimstone.

In this connection the prophecy of Malachi is significant. He says "Behold, the day cometh that shall burn as an oven; and all that do wickedly, shall be as stubble; and the day that cometh shall burn them up, saith the Lord of hosts, that it shall leave them neither root nor branch." (Malachi 4:1) The unrighteous and proud must either turn away from their course or be destroyed. The day of conflict will take away all grounds for pride; but if any still persist in opposition to the truth and the God of truth, they will perish.

Many now are on the side of unrighteousness because they are blinded by Satan. Such will be delivered by the Christ. They will be given a knowledge of the plan and purpose of God, so that they may call upon his name and serve him with one consent, as foretold by the Prophet Zephaniah.
