It is said that more than five per cent of the farm land is now used for poppy cultivation and eight percent of the population are smokers of opium.

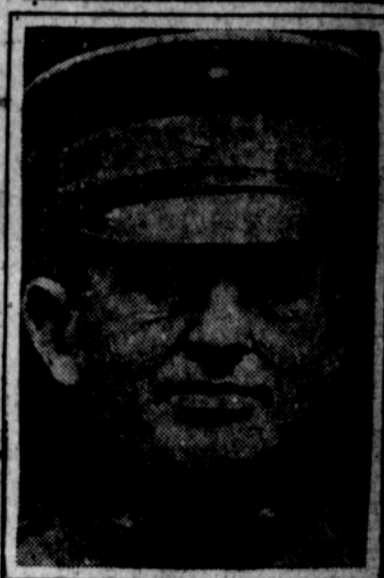
TURB ON LEPROSY FOUND BY LATVIAN SCIENTIST

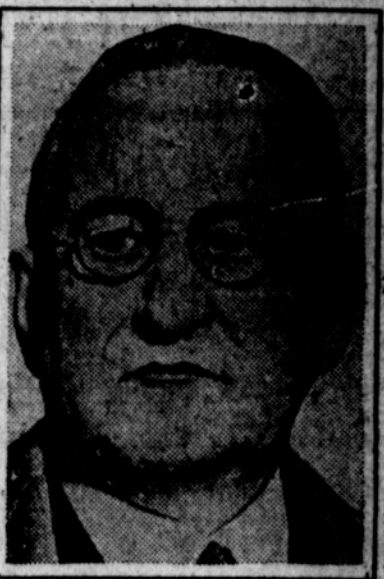
