All Testimony in Hearing of Evangelist Given Thursday.

DECISION IS EXPECTED Carmel Incident to be Stressed

by Prosecution in Closing

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 29 .-(United News)-Bringing to a close five weeks of sensational charges and counter charges, the fate of Aimee Semple McPherson was consigned to the argumentative powers of her attorneys when the defense rested its case late Thursday.

The final stage of the long and turbulent preliminary hearing will be enacted next Wednesday morning when the state, through District Attorney Asa Keyes, wil! demand that the evangelist, with her mother and other co-defendants be bound over for trial in superior court on charges of perjury and conspiracy to defeat justice.

To File Briefs

In the interim the defense will file a brief with the court, proably on Monday, setting forth its reasons to prove no crime had been committed, to be followed a few hours later by the state's declarations to the oppo-

The prosecution, it was learned, will stress the Carmel-by-the-Sea angle of the case. The state will direct its greatest efforts to establishment of the fact that the evangelist and Kenneth G. Ormiston occupied a "love cottage" at Carmel, during a period when she was supposed to have been held captive by kidnapers who spirited her away from Ocean Park beach last May.
