

TAUTNESS OF PLANE WING CLOTH MEASURED
WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—(UP)—Experts of the Bureau of Standards have discovered an instrument to measure the tautness of fabric covering airplane wings.

The new instrument is so constructed that a portion of the tension in it measured without fabric may be isolated and the disturbing the covering in any way.

CHINA PARTICIPATES IN ARTS AND SCIENCE MEET

PEKING — (UP) — China will participate in the Third Pan-Pacific Congress of Arts and Science to be held in Tokyo today until November 1, according to decision of the Cabinet. An appropriation of \$5,000 was voted for this purpose, but it was not divulged where the bankrupt Peking Government was going to get the money.

A check for \$1000 was sent recently by radio from London to New York.

7 PER CENT OF CZECHO-SLOVAKIA'S STUDENTS ARE ATHEISTS
PRAGUE — (UP) — Seven percent of the pupils and students of Czecho-Slovakia's schools, colleges, and universities are atheists, or without confession according to the statistics just made public.

Among the University students the percentage is highest, namely 18 percent. In the Industrial Schools the figure is 13; in the Commercial Schools 12 and in the elementary or graded schools 7. The average in the kindergartens, where the religion of each child or absence thereof is given by the parents, the percentage is 10.

Electrification of the Central Railway of Brazil is to be started before the first of the year.

ALBANIA HAS NO TRAINS
DURAZZO, Albania, (UP) — This country, the only nation in Europe without a mile of railroad trackage is about to build a railroad.

It will extend for only thirty-seven kilometers, connecting Tirana with this port. Under Albanian law, the government is empowered to ask each man below the age of fifty years to work for six days in the year for the state, and under this system the railroad will be built. The cost will therefore be comparatively low.

OFFICIALS DISCHARGED PEKING — (UP) — Desolation has been spread through official circles by the "firing" of ten Foreign Office officials, and an intimation that others are on the list for discharge. Many Peking job-holders have sinecures, it is alleged and draw pay from half a dozen or more government posts without doing real work in any of them.

24-HOUR TIME DAYS ADOPTED IN SWEDEN

STOCKHOLM, (UP) — Times tables of 24 hours instead of twice 12 will be issued by the Swedish railroads next spring and a similar subdivision of the day is likely to be adopted soon by the postal service and other public departments.

The administration of the Swedish telegraphs and telephones has used the 24 hour scheme since 1909 and thus the public is already partly accustomed to saying 15 o'clock, instead of 3 p. m. or 21 o'clock, instead of 9 p. m., exactly as they do in France.

How to adopt the dials of clocks and watches has not yet been decided, but it is likely that the afternoon hours will be printed in a different color inside the morning figures, as they now are on the clocks of the government telegraph bureaus.
